Your Committee recognize fully the importance of keeping the Lectures and esoteric work of the order uniform throughout the jurisdiction, and recommend that the Grand Lecturer be required, upon the evening of the first day of the annual session, in each year, to hold a Lodge of Instruction, and give full and explicit instruction in all the degrees.

Your Committee also recommend that every County Master in the jurisdiction be required to supply himself with the instructions prepared for them; and that they take especial pains to see that their County Lecturers are thoroughly instructed in the private work, and that at each meeting of the County Lodge, thorough and full instructions be given therein to all in attendance.

To the R. W. Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Orange Lodge of Ontario West.

BROTHERN—I beg herewith to submit my Fourth Annual Report as Medical Referee of the Orange Mutual Benefit Society of Ontario West.

During the year ending 5th March, 1888, I received 252 Medical Examinations, of which 8 were rejected, 1 held for further inquiries, and 243 passed.
