

After leaving the Force and spending some time in the Caribou district, Mr. Marlin returned to his birthplace at Ottawa, Ontario. During the Boer War he saw active service and on demobilization proceeded to Kamloops where he resided until his death.

Regimental No. 9754—Ex-Constable Herbert Patrick Lee

Mr. H. P. Lee, a member of the reportorial Staff of the New York "Sun", and an ex-member of the R.C.M. Police, was accidentally killed by a freight train at Long Island City, U.S.A., on November 11th, 1936. He was 37 years of age.

Mr. Lee was born in Nottingham, England, on August 12th, 1899. At 16 he enlisted in the London Scottish Regiment and spent a year on active service in France. After being wounded at Vis-en-Artois on June 26th, 1917, he was transferred to the Royal Air Force. On being demobilized in 1919, Mr. Lee proceeded to Canada and joined the R.C.M. Police on February 10th, 1921, being stationed at Craig Harbour Detachment in the eastern Arctic.

Leaving the Force on January 3rd, 1925, Mr. Lee entered newspaper work in the U.S.A., being at first employed on the staff of the "Newark Ledger". Later he worked for the New York "Mirror", and during 1928 and 1929 was in Paris, France, with the "Temps".

Mr. Lee was the author of a number of books, the last published one being a novel, "North of the Stars" which had appeared serially in the Argosy magazine. Other books included "Policing the Top of the World", "The Heritage of the North", "The Girl from Baffin Land", "Baffins' Gold" and "Hell's Harbour".

Regimental No. 212—Ex-Constable James Armstrong Workman

Mr. J. A. Workman died at Clyde, Alberta, on October 17th, aged 76 years.

Mr. Workman first engaged in the Force on June 17th, 1878, and took his discharge on May 19th, 1880. During the Great War he served overseas on active service with the 194th Battalion.

Regimental No. 383—Ex-Constable Harold Ross

Mr. Harold Ross passed away on October 23rd, at Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, aged 77 years.

Mr. Ross joined the N.W.M. Police on June 9th, 1879, and left the service five years later at the termination of his period of engagement. Subsequent to leaving the Force, Mr. Ross acted as a Police Scout and took an active part in the Riel Rebellion. In 1887 he was appointed Sheriff of Prince Albert and later held office as Collector of Inland Revenue until 1906.

In 1909, Mr. Ross was appointed Registrar and in 1927 retired from the Land Titles office. Mr. Ross was also a member of a local law fraternity at Prince Albert, and had resided in that city for 56 years at the time of his death.

Regimental No. 431—Ex-Constable Arthur R. Moody

Mr. Arthur R. Moody died at Vilna, Alberta, at the commencement of November, 1936, aged 76 years.

Mr. Moody first joined the N.W.M.P. on June 25th, 1880, and served until July 27th, 1885, when he took his discharge at the expiration of his period of engagement. On retiring from the Force he resided for many years at Beaver Lake, and afterwards moved to the vicinity of Cork, Alberta. It is understood that he was visiting Vilna for medical treatment at the time of his decease. Mr. Moody was a holder of the Riel Rebellion Medal of 1885.

Regimental No. 3218—Ex-A/Corporal Denis Charles Burke

Mr. D. C. Burke, an ex-member of the N.W.M.P. died recently in the vicinity of High River, Alberta, aged 63 years.
