Toronto, March 24.—The case of John Doughty, accused of theft of \$105,000 in bonds from his former employer, the missing theatre owner, Ambrose Small, was given to the jury this afternoon, after Judge Denton had instructed the jury as to the law in the case. R. H. Greer, crown prosecutor, and I. F. Hellmuth, counsel for the prisoner, had previously addressed the jury to some length, the former holding that the conduct of the prisoner in the matter was not that of an honest man. The prisoner's lawyer maintained that Doughty may have been foolish in his dealings with the bonds, but that there had been no evidence of criminal intent.

Judge Denton, in his charge to the jury, pointed out that Doughty undoubtedly had the right to enter the vault of his employer's business. He was also justified in thinking that Mr. Small might reward him for service.



Ottawa, March 24.-Canadian Press.-Any elector whose name does not appear on the voters' list as a voter in the coming Ontario prohibition referendum on April 18, must make personal application to the revising officer in order to have his or her name placed on that list. In a circular issued to revising officers and returning officers, Col. M. Biggar, electoral officer, states "no application can be made by proxy whether or not the proxy is a relative or employer." ipating in the Greek offensive against the Turkish Nationalist orces in Asia Minor it is reported here. The Turkish Nationalists are believed to number some 90,000 in the field, but have smaller supplies upon which to draw. The most careful preparations were made by the Greeks in connection with the offensive, which began vesterday, and it is anticipated here that the Greeks will win important positions with their first drive.
