The lecture was a fitting climax to a week which has been one of the most successful in the history of the Lutheran Church in Canada.

During the afternoon the delegates were given a pleasure auto ride around the Twin City. They visited the parks and other places of interest and all expressed the desire to return to Waterloo next year and attend the second annual summer school.

The registered attendance numbered two hundred and twenty six. Not credit is due to the energetic committee that promoted it. A special resolution of appreciation to the W.M.S., the Committee, the various lecturers, the Kitchener Choirs, and all others who had contributed to the success of the school was passed at the concluding session.

Preparations are already under way to hold a similar school next year during the last week in July.
