

## MINISTER OF GROWN LANDS HAS RESIGNED HIS SEAT

Hon. E. J. Davis, M. P. P. has made this move to avoid filing of particulars in the North York Election Protest--- A thunderclap to Toronto Liberals.

publishes the following in its early editions to-day and repeats it in its last issue to-night :-

Hon. E. J. Davis, Commissioner of Crown Lands in the Ontario Government, has resigned his seat in the

This announcement, made prematurely on the eye of the by-elections. to be held in North Perth, North Nor folk and North Grey to-morrow, came this morning with a dramatic force and suddenness which set the whole city speculating and caused intensely regretful feelings to Premier Ross and his colleagues, who had hoped that the publication might be deferred until after the critical seventh of January had passed.

That the announcement came like thunder-clap to the Liberals of Toronto is not to be denied. Few Conservatives, save those of the inner circle, knew anything of the arrangement that had been quietly negotiated between the Minister and the Conservative managers. The Globe had an inkling into the matter this morning, when it stated in its first editionthat which goes to the country-that the "petition" had "been settled." It was not stated by the Liberal organ what the settlement was, but in political phraseology the expression "has been settled" usually means that the case against the member concerned has been abandoned. But it does not denote what has happened in this case—that the member has abandoned consented to pay the costs of the pro-

test proceedings. In the second edition of the Globe the item referred to was left out, and the city readers of the organ were left in ignorance of the matter. The ed Mr. Davis no end of uneasiness plan of the Liberals certainly seems to have been to make this announcement for the benefit of the readers in North Grey, North Norfolk and North Perth, with a view to minimizing the effect of the statement that the Conservative papers will make to-morrow. It will be seen that it will be fairly easy for a Liberal stumper to confuse He can truththe average elector. fully assert that Mr. Davis has not resigned either his seat in the House or his portfolio. The news at the Parliament Build ings has a remarkable effect. Hon. G. W. Roes gave out an interview in which he denied that Mr. Davis has resigned either his seat in the House or his portfolio. This statement was absolutely accurate, for the resignation will not be handed to the Cherk of the House for som days yet. This is where the Conservatives seem to have made a tacticall mistake in allowing the announce ment to be defrayed untul the effect in to-morrow's by-elections could be mullified by Mr. Ross' denial.

Mr. T. Herbert Lennox was called up over the long-distance telephone this afternoon. Speaking from New market, Mr. Lennox said:

WHY HE RESIGNS. The trial of the charges preferred by T. H. Lennox, the defeated Conservative candidate, was fixed for January 20th, but previous to that the examination for discovery, as permitted by law, takes place. To prevent these particulars being delivered, and thus smuff our further publicity to personal charges involving himself and his political friends, the minister took the action referred to.

The minister has practically admitted all these charges by deciding to resign and pay all costs.
