FUNDAMENTAL PRINCIPLES OF LIBERALISM Unity, Security and Freedom

National Broadcast by The Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Leader of the Liberal Party and Prime Minister of Canada.

Ottawa, December 11, 1946.

The present broadcast is one in a series designed by the C.B.C. to give the Canadian public a better understanding of the principles and policies of the several political parties. On earlier occasions, some of my colleagues have spoken on particular policies of the present Administration. Tonight, I intend to speak to you in more general terms. I wish to re-state, in the light of conditions as they exist today, and more particularly as they are related to the future, certain fundamental principles of the Liberal Party of Canada.

The purpose of political parties.

But, first, a word about political parties themselves. Principles and policies are of little avail unless means can be found whereby like-minded men and women are able to make their principles and policies prevail. A political party is a means to this end.

A political party is not an end in itself. It is the means whereby men and women gain the public support required to enable them to carry out their policies.
