Jardine is Hanged

Goderich, June 16.-Without benefit the body of Edward Benjamin Jardine hanged for murder, at the age of 22, was lowered into the grave in Colborne Township cemetery this morning, three hours after the life had left it. For the killing of Elizabeth Anderson, a Saltford young woman of 17, last September, near the fair grounds, Jardine paid the death penalty in a yard of Huron County ail at eight o'clock to-day. The young man carried himself bravely to the end. He thanked the officials with camposure for the manner in which they had treated him, and said "Good-bye all" as the black cap was placed over his head. Jardine, who has been in a cell on the east side of the jail, opposite to the yard in which the scaffold was, erected, ate blast a reputation more effectively than an egg, some fruit and toast for break fast, and seemed in no way broken down. The Census.

Census takers are at work in every ne of the 221 constituencies in Canada and by October it will be known if the population of this country has reached the 81 million mark as has been so confidently predicted by those who have been noting the remarkable growth of Canada during the last few years.

The growth of Canada up till 1901 vas quite stow. In 1871 the population was 3,680,257, ten years later it had increased to 4,324,810, by the next decade the enumerators' figures showed 4,833, 239 and ten years ago showed an increase of only 11%, bringing the population up 5,371,315. The increase by the present census is expected to be at least 50% which would be a greater increase than for the past thirty years.

Ontario's gain in population for the ten years from 1891 to 1901 was only While cities and some towns 31%. showed large increases, they were more than offset by the decreases in the rural districts. The large increases by the present census will be in the four Western provinces and if there should be an election held before a redistribution of seats is made which always follows the taking of the census, it would be manifestly unfair to the West where the population has about doubled in the last ten

At present the West is represented in the Commons as follows: Alberta 7, British Columbia 7, Manitoba 10 and Saskatchewan 10. With one from the Yukon this makes the Western strength in the present House of Commons 35. The redistribution of ridings after the census will add some 15 seats more to the West and Ontario stands to lose 4 members again as was the case after the last redistribution. The Maritime Provnces will also show a falling off and possibly the representation of N. S., N. B, and P. E. I. will be reduced by 4 making the membership of the new House of Commons 228, Quebec being the unit of representation, according to the British North America Act, can neither gain nor lose, the representation of that province being placed at 65 and this number used as the divisor into the population of Quebec, gives the basis for representation of all the other prov-

From 1885 till 1908, the representation of Ontario was 92 but for the last 3 years has been only 86 and it looks as though the premier province which has been supplying so many of the settlers for the Western provinces, would again be reduced in its Federal strength.

The growing West will more and more lictate the policy of Canada and there s one thing we may rest assured of and hat is that in future the tendency in ariffs will be downwards as the farmers increase in numbers and the influence of Eastern cities wanes.
