

INTERESTING ADDRESSES AT THE AM. E. CONFERENCE

His Lordship The Bishop and Others Spoke Last Evening—A Large Attendance.

At 8:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon the African Methodist Episcopal conference assembled, with Rev. P. E. Kersey in the chair. The session was opened with the singing of the hymn, "In Thy Clift, O Rock of Ages." This was followed by prayer, led by Brother Pearson, after which a second hymn, "I Am Thine, O Lord," was sung. This was followed by the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting, which after a few corrections were on motion adopted.

A very interesting and encouraging report from Amherst was then read and adopted. Rev. F. W. Johnston then stated that the money collected at Easter was appropriated to pay debts of the church, the amount being sixteen dollars.

It was then decided that the speakers at the evening session would be Revs. B. McConnell, T. U. Johnston and A. Kersey.

Rev. Mr. Johnston in a neat address eulogized the good work of the pastor of St. Phillips, after which the meeting adjourned.

At the evening session some very interesting and able addresses were delivered by His Lordship the Bishop and others.

His Worship the Mayor was invited to welcome the visiting clergymen to the city, but owing to the fact that he had previously been invited to be present at the Temple of Honor banquet he was unable to accept the invitation. A letter was received from him to that effect, in which he also expressed his regret at his inability to be present.

Rev. H. McIntyre welcomed the visitors in his usual, in a very neat and inspiring address Mr. McIntyre bid a hearty welcome to the visitors, and spoke of the honor of having present his lordship Bishop Durkin. He urged that uniformity be instilled into the African people in the city.

Rev. T. B. McConnell of Amherst responded to the address of welcome. He thanked Mr. McIntyre for his cordial reception in behalf of the citizens of St. John, after which he briefly reviewed the history of the colored American from the time of slavery in the southern states to the present time. Speaking as the son of a slave he very pathetically described the unfortunate condition existing in the time of slavery.

Rev. Angus Graham of St. David's Presbyterian Church was then called upon, and made a very warm address, in which he spoke of the people of all colors as being born of the same blood, consequently they were all brothers.

His lordship then briefly addressed the people of the white race as having freed the colored people from their bondage. The Union Jack, he thought, was the best flag under which to live. He spoke of English imperialism as having given evidence of being beneficial to the colonies by raising the colonial affairs to a higher civilization. The meeting was brought to a close with the singing of God Save the King and the doxology.

The conference will be in session here until Sunday evening.

perity to the workmen. The island is going ahead rapidly. Sugar is the most important product of the island at present, and there are sections where you can travel for days and never be out of sight of a big sugar mill, representing an investment of from a hundred thousand to a million dollars. There is lots of room yet, however, as only twenty per cent of the land is under the plow. The population is only two millions, while Java, an island of about the same size, supports twenty-eight million people. At the rate they are developing now, however, they will have to charter some more islands in a few years on which to store the money they are making.

GREAT POSSIBILITIES.

"There are great possibilities there for trade with Canada. Lumber and potatoes are the products which would sell best, but there is an opportunity to build up a trade in many of the things that Canada produces. Some of these things are wheat, corn, and a good steamship service would be in order that an intelligent effort might be made to fill them probably. A VISIONARY SCHEME.

They have a visionary scheme of developing electrical power to be used for the island. As far as the suggestion, that power might be brought as far as St. John from Grand Falls, I would say that that is totally impracticable. What we would do is to show by what we have done at River St. Maurice, where our mill supports a community of from fifteen to twenty thousand people, that it is possible to have a valuable asset to the community, giving steady employment to a large number of people permanently. It is not like lumbering, for instance, which sweeps a country bare and then leaves it.

In reply to a question touching on the policy of the C. P. R., Sir William said: "I am no longer the spokesman for that road. Sir Thomas Stangerhouse does the talking for the C. P. R., and it would not do to have more than one spokesman or with a smile, 'his might not all be consistent. He might, however, profess himself perfectly satisfied with the condition of the company and the progress it is making."

URBAN RAILWAYS.

Sir William's heavy investment in Cuban railways makes him interested in the property of that island. He spoke in a most hopeful manner of the city republic. "The climate," he said, "is ideal and the temperature does not cross above eighty. We had a couple of days in Montreal recently that was just like the climate of the island. Contrary to the impression that prevails in the north, the natives here are not industrious, but the crop season work from autumn to the end of the year is done by the natives. They get about a dollar and a quarter a day now, which is good pay for the kind of work they do. When I was here only received about forty cents a day, but the development of the island's resources has brought a share of progress."

FREDERICTON, N. B., Aug. 11.—Governor Tweed presided at a meeting of the Board of Education this morning. The resignation of Dr. Creed as instructor of English at the Normal School was accepted, and A. Sterling MacFarlane of Fredericton High School staff was appointed. Chief Superintendent Carter was authorized to convey to Dr. Creed an expression of the board's appreciation of his long and faithful services.

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3,000,000 BUSHELS OF CORN IS 1909 CROP

Yield of Wheat a Bumper, Too, According to Government Report

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—A crop of over 3,000,000 bushels of corn and 725,000,000 bushels of wheat was indicated in the government report issued this afternoon, for which grain markets all over the world have been expectant for the last week.

The condition of corn was \$4.4 against \$3.3 in July. The reduction of 5 points was greater than had been anticipated, and it showed how much damage had been done by the combined forces of heat and drought in some states and floods in others.

However, the prospect is for a corn yield of 3,000,000 bushels. Last month the experts were figuring on a production of 2,800,000, which would have been much in excess of any crop ever raised. The indicated yield of today is about bumper proportions. Corn prices were up a little on the report.

In wheat there was another story to tell. The farmers of the Northwest have never had a better season than this. For weeks the water has been high, so that the crop ripened early, and harvesting is now in progress all through Minnesota and in the Dakotas.

A month ago the condition of spring wheat was 22.7, which was extremely high. On August 1st it was 21.3, 10 points above a ten year average for that date. The estimated spring wheat crop is 290,000,000 bushels, which compares with an actual yield last year of 280,000,000 bushels. The winter wheat has practically all been harvested, and is now moving to market, so the only interest in today's report was in the total harvest, which was 435,000,000 bushels, or about 5,000,000 short of the 1908 crop.
