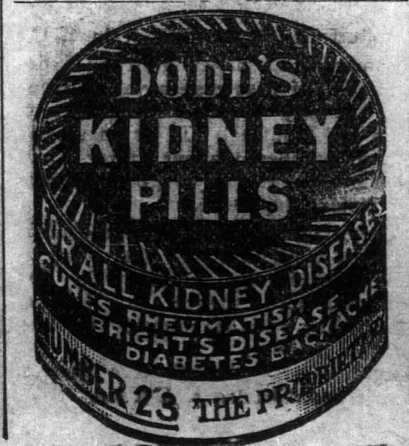
Broke Even With Kockneys
