SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN WEST LAND REGULATION

The sole head of a family, or over 18 years old, may homestead a section of arable Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency in the district. Entry by proxy made at any Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency, on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence on cultivation of the land in each year. A homesteader may live five miles of his homestead on a lot of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. Live stock may be substituted for residence under certain conditions. In certain districts a homesteader may pre-empt a section alongside his homestead, \$300 per acre. Duties—Six months residence, of three years after earning his patent. Entry by proxy made soon as homesteaded land on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his right may take a purchase deed in certain districts. Price, \$100 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months of three years, cultivate 50 acres of a house worth \$1000. W. W. CORY, Deputy Minister of the Interior. N.
