SIGNIFICANT

A notable incident recently recorded in the West and related in the Courier is worthy of additional emphasis. George H. Bradbury, Conservative M.P. for Brantford, was tendered a banquet in the Royal Alexandra Hotel, Winnipeg, which was attended by over five hundred guests.

Mr. Bradbury, who was attended to at the banquet with a gold watch with this inscription, "To George H. Bradbury, from the Market Gardeners of Kildonan, Man., in recognition of your fight against reciprocity." Kildonan is the market garden district of Selkirk riding, and is now in Winnipeg. Two-thirds of the market gardeners are Liberals.

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A SPLENDID STEP.

An important step has been taken by Hon. Frank Cochrane, Minister of Railways, with a view to protecting the line of the new Hudson Bay Railway from Le Pas, the terminus, to Port Nelson, a Canadian port.

The Government has decided to give a strip half a mile wide on each side of the railway from Le Pas to Port Nelson. The intention is to protect the public from land speculators and to make certain that all highways and necessary terminations along the road will be in the hands of the Government.

Official action of the intention of the Government has already been given in the Canada Gazette.

This action has been taken by the old Government, as it should have been, the Canadian people would have saved many thousands of dollars. Mr. Cochrane finds that the necessary terminals for the road at Le Pas will cost the country a big sum running up into the tens of thousands.
