The Release of a Couple of Americans Jailed from Merlin Order ed by Government.

A very unusual incident in Canadian international affairs has just come to a head here. It appears that the authorities at the village of Merlin about a month ago arrested a man and his wife on a charge of vagrancy. They were convicted, and the man was sentenced to six months in jail, and his wife received a 90 days' sentence. United States. They were in possession M some money, and stated to the authorities that they were going to Detroit and had only stopped in Merlin on their way through. Their pleadings had no effect and they were brought here and incarcerated in the county jail. The United States consul, Col. Chas. E. Montieth, learned of the affair. Upon making an investigation he found that the parties were, as they claimed, American citizens, as they claimed, American citizens, and he corresponded with the Washington authorities. The result of the negotiations are that Sheriff Gemmill has been instructed by the governorgeneral of Canada upon the representations made by the United States authorities to at once release the prison thorities to at once release the pris thorities to at once release the prisoners, whose names are given as Mr. and Mrs. Robert Giger. The man and his wife are to be at once sent to Detroit. It is not known whether any further proceedings hay arise from this international affair or not.

## ANARCHIST PLOT.

The Italians Believe In the Existence of One.

Five Arrests Made in Monza-Govern ment Issues a Manifesto.

Rome, July 31 .- The Tribuna says the assassination of King Humbert is believed to have been the result of a plot. A non-militant anarchist recently declared, so the Tribuna asserts, that a meeting had been held in Paris at which lots were drawn and several persons were selected to kill the King. The papers announce that King Victor Emmanuel III. will reach Brindisi to-day and will go directly to Monza. Besides Bressi, five persons have been taken into custody at Monza.

In the absence of the new king the ministry has issued in his name a manifesto to the nation, as follows:
King Victor Emmanuel III., in ascending the throne, has to perform the painful duty of announcing to the country the awful calamity which has

country the awful calamity which has violently cut short the valuable life of King Humbert.

The nation, wounded in its sincere affection for the august dead, and in a sincere feeling of devotion and adhesion to the dynasty, while execrating the cruel crime, will be plunged into profound grief for the venerated mem ory of a good, brave and magnanmous king, the pride of his people, and the worthy perpetuator of the traditions of the house of Savoy, by rallying with unshaken loyalty around his august successor, Italians will prove by their deeds that their institutions do not die.

The king is expected to arrive at Reggi di Calabria to-morrow. He re-ceived the news of the death of his fa-ther by semaphore.

THE TRANSFER SET ASIDE.

Over eighty years old and nearly totally blind, Mary Hicks lived a lonely life in Chatham, with no one to take care of her. A domestic named Mary Johnston took comp sion on the old lady and went and lived with her, cooking the meals and doing the house-work. This kindness touched the heart of the old lady, and she deeded all her property in Chatham to her benefactress. Later remorse set in and Mrs. Hicks brough an action to set aside the convey ance. At Toronto yesterday morning Chief Justice Falconbridge gave judgment, declaring the deed "void and of no effect on the ground of improvi-dence, want of independent and com-petent professional advice and ab-sence of consideration." His Lordship also found that undue influence had been practiced.

The judgment which is by Justice Falcon-bridge declares the impeached conveyance yold on the grounds of improvidence, want of independent and competent professional advice and absence of consideration, and directing its delivery up for cancellation. The maintenance already furnished to plaintiff and the taxes paid, and the improvement (the value of which is \$32) made by de fendant are to be set off against occupation of premises by defendant. Order for immediate possession of premises. Stay for one week to enable defer, and to remove her things from the premises. Plaintiff did not ask for, and there is no order as to costs. C. J.
