FRASER IS OUT-TO WIN!

For malicious intent and deliberate falsehood-we speak plainly, and the occasion warrants it-the statement which appeared on the front page of yesterday's Banner with big head lines to the effect that John S. Fraser, the Liberal-Conservative candidate for West Kent, had announced his intention of withdrawing his candidacy owing to dissentions in his party, has never been equalled in the history of Canadian journalism.

The Banner-we have too high a respect for the many estimable citizens who are identified with its politics to longer designate it the Liberal organ -is apparently determined to severely test the resolution of this journal, and the political party with which it has the privilege of being identified, to conduct a clean and honorable campaign. To combat, day by day, the slanderous personal attacks, the outbreaks of vituperation and indecency, the malicious untruths, which have permeated its pages, and seek to maintain that dignity and decency which should surely characterize the conduct and campaigning of intelligent men is, in the parlance of the pointed,

#### THE BELL APPOINTMENT.

The lists are to be prepared privately and secretly and the clerks engaged in copying them and making them up can, with comparative ease, disfranchise men entitled to vote or, for that matter, place names upon the list that have no right to be there. They can assure the temporary Clark of the Peace that their work is properly done so that he may attach his cer-

tificate thereto. For such duties then it was right to suppose that all question of bias or doubt would be allayed by the appointment of an impartial official removed from the active arena of

politics. The proper course, in the estimation of this journal, would have been to procure the services of his honor Judge Bell, Judge Woods or Police Magistrate Houston to perform the duties, or-and it would have been fully as satisfactory and unquestionable-to have the Clerks of the municipalities certify the various copies themselves and leave the matter of the preparation of the poll-books with the returning officer, Sheriff Gem-
