WANTS A MONUMENT

On Tecumseh Park to Both Donegan and Tecumseh.

To the Planet,—There have been various suggestions as to the best manner of doing honor to the gallant lad who fell at Paardeberg. The Mayor proposes a monument on Tecumseh Park, W. E. McKenough proposes a memorial window in the Catholic Church, and W. E. Hamilton suggests a ward in the Catholic hospital.

I think I am voicing the opinion of the vast majority when I say that the memorial should be of such a description that it will remain for all time as an object lesson to young and old of the esteem in which the man in held who fearlessly does his duty to his country. A ward in the hospital is very useful for the sick, but is not a very pleasant object to look or think upon. A memorial window is very appropriate should his relatives or co-religionists so desire to express their appreciation.

But I look upon J. A. Donegan's death as worthy of a more national expression. The brave lads who died in South Africa shed their blood not only to prove the courage of Canadians, but along with the blood of the Australians, New Zealanders, other Colonials and British, to form a better than old Roman cement for binding together the wide-spread nations comprising the British Empire. For these reasons I consider a monument on the park as the only fitting proposal. There it will stand for generations, honored by all, irrespective of race or religion. But while we are trying to do honor to one whom we know why not combine with it a fitting memorial to one of our old-time heroes: one than whom none more worthy ever lived—Tecumseh, the great warrior chief. History records that he was wounded on the very park which he wanted to make the key of the defensive he proposed to the General Proctor against Harrison in 1813. We have long wished to see a monument erected to him; and by combining the two we can have an historical monument at a moderate cost, as the one pedestal is all that is required. Then, as the Government saw fit to erect a monument to Brant, at Brantford, at the expense of the country, a grant secured for the purpose by our members of parliament, Messrs. Stephens and Pardo, will enable us to have a memorial to the two heroes of which we may feel proud.

Place the old warrior chief, as he died for Canada, with his face to the foe from the west, and our brave boy who fell with a smile on his face and a song on his lips as he charged the trenches, placed facing the east, looking upon the sunrise of Imperial Unity,

VERY NICE POINT.

Should a Cabinet Minister Also be a Stock Broker?

The English Liberals Think not—Great Britain Will not Interfere in the Nicaragua Canal Matter.

London, Dec. 15.—In the House of Lords yesterday, Lord Hardwick's answer to Lord Rosebery's criticism in the House at the re-assembling of Parliament, Dec. 7, when the latter referred to the former, now Under Secretary of State for India, as being a member of a firm of stock brokers. He said that which he had been offered the appointment, he had explained to Lord Salisbury and to Lord George Hamilton, the Secretary of State for India, that though he would relinquish active business, he would not sever his connection with his firm.

After Lord Rosebery had reasserted the correctness of his principles, Lord Salisbury took exception to the soundness of Lord Rosebery's views. He said Lord Rosebery had raised a similar clap-net against stock brokers, as he had raised, against directors, who were not members of the mercantile community. If not one connected with commercial government was capable of filling a government post not only was a stigma cast upon an honorable profession, but the circle of men available for the services of the State was seriously diminished. The field for the selection of ministers was small in this country. The doctrine invented by Lord Rosebery was of no value for any practical purpose.

IN THE COMMONS.

In the House of Commons the attempt of Henry Norman, Liberal, to draw the government on the subject of the Nicaragua Canal, Secretary for the Foreign Office, contenting himself with replying to the effect that no communication has passed between Great Britain and the other European governments with the view of eliciting (whether they agreed to regard as neutral a canal occupied and fortified by the United States. No useful purpose, Lord Cranborne added, could be served at the present moment by replying to the other paragraphs of the question of Mr. Norman. These asking if Nicaragua's committee view that the relations of the United States and Nicaragua was analogous to that

of Turkey and Egypt at the time of the construction of the Suez Canal, namely, the relationship of suzerain and vassal, and if the United States associated itself with the protocol signed at the London conference of March 13, 1871, to the effect that no power could liberate itself from the engagements of a treaty without the assent of the contracting parties.

Gerald Balfour, president of the Board of Trade, replying to a question of C. P. Trevelyan, Liberal, said the board had received several communications regarding the extortion of "blood money" from seamen at Portland, Oregon. The matter had been brought to the attention of the Foreign Office.

After the war ban bill had passed the committee stage, the House adjourned.
