WILL GO TO THE

Evidence in the Sensational Bosschieter Murder Case Concluded.

Striking Scenes Connected With th Closing Arguments of Counsel.

Paterson, N. J., Jan. 17 .- For the entire session to-day the opposing counsel in the Jennie Bosschieter murder trial appealed to the jury. Assist. Prosecuting Attorney Ralph Shaw began the summing up for the state. It was expected that Mr. Emly would do this, but he merely offered in evidence a part of Jennie Bosschieter's wardrobe.
Mr. Shaw, in summing up, claimed

that the state had proven its case, and that in every contention had been sustained. He denounced the accused, who, he said, had taken the girl cut to her death like a dog. He demandto her death like a dog. He demanded that the jury render such a verdict as the law and evidence demanded, one of guilty in the highest degree.

Then ex-Judge Francis Scott led in the summing up for the defense. He was followed by Michael Dunn. Their addresses were very similar. They declared that no case had been made out against Walter Medilister Wm. Death against Walter McAlister, Wm. Deatl and Andrew Campbell. They ridiculed the expert testimony and branded the hackamn, Sculthorp, as a man of the lowest type, and of the basest motives. They maintained that the story told by him was not supported by evidence, and that it was a lie. Mr. Scott made a point that if Scuithorpe's story were to be believed at all he should be a prisoner accused of participation in the

Mr. Scott was arguing that the state had fafled to prove its first count, that of assault, when Judge Dixon intermpted him, saying:

"Before you proceed I want the jury to understand that if chloral were given or if a person were struck or choked in order to accomplish the assault, the poison or violence is a part off the assault. The jury must not be misled on that point."

The coursel for the defense declared that it had not been proven that chloral was administered to the girl, and maintained that it had not been proven
