As may be surmised by the score, the game was close, but it was very rough at times. O. A. Harper acted as referee. Mitchell's Bay will play the Chatham team, either Wednesday or Thursday afternoon of this week.

A RESPECTED GENTLEMAN

A short service was held at the late residence of the late John Smith, Water street, last evening. It was conducted by Rev. Mr. MacGillivray and Rev. Dr. Daniel. A large number of sympathizers attended to pay the last and office of respect to the memory of the departed gentleman; and the unbounded sympathy of all was extended to the widow and surviving members of the family.

CONTINUATION CLASS WORK

East Kent stands first in the Province in relation to continuation classes in connection with Public School work. At Blenheim, Chatham, Dresden, Thamesville and Bothwell large continuation classes are being taught, and these schools are doing splendid work—offering in fact High school advantages. The excellent work of the Blenheim school has recently been noted. At Dresden, also, we learn from the Times, some seventy-eight pupils are taking continuation work. The Government rightly looks with favor on these schools.

The effect of a recent regulation of the Education Department has been to place continuation schools of grade A in somewhat the position of High schools in awarding the annual grant. The annual grants taking the legislative and county together will be based on the following and as follows:

1. \$400 where two teachers are employed.
2. 5 per cent. of the excess of salaries over \$900.
3. 2 per cent. on the value of the library up to \$300.
4. 2 per cent. on the value of the scientific apparatus up to \$300.
5. 2 per cent. on the value of the maps, globes, drawing models up to \$100.
6. \$45 on the character of the accommodation, including blackboards, bookshelves, desks, heating, ventilation, etc.
