Monday Night's Council Meeting.

At the meeting of the town council held on Monday evening to confer with the executive of the Fruit Growers' Association with regard to the proposal to locate the Agricultural School and Farm here, the Mayor and all the members of the council except Couns. Borden were present, with the recorder. There were present representing the F. G. A., Pres. Bigelow, Messrs P. Innes, Wm. Young, W. C. Archibald, and Drs. Chapman and DeWitt. The outcome of the meeting was the passing of the following resolution:

Whereas the rebuilding of a College of Agriculture is under the consideration of the Nova Scotia Government, and as it is the opinion of this Council that the best interests of the whole province would be advanced by establishing said College at Wolfville in connection with the School of Horticulture, and thereby increasing the usefulness of both institutions; and

Whereas the County of Kings has voted a bonus of \$5000 and the Nova Scotia Fruit Growers' Association has offered the effects of the Horticultural School in valued at \$2000; therefore

Resolved that should a further sum be required to pay expenses of locating said College at Wolfville this Council will call a meeting of the electors of this town and advocate the granting of a sum not to exceed \$5000 for aforesaid purpose; and

Whereas several desirable properties within the town are now in the market at fair prices, admirably adapted for the location of said School and Experimental Farm, it is

Further Resolved that the said Government be requested favorably to consider the advantage of establishing said College and Farm at Wolfville, and that a copy of the resolution be forwarded at once to the Provincial Sec'y.

Wolfville Art Association.

For some time past a feeling has been growing in the minds of those particularly interested in Art that an organization should be formed whereby this line of study might be developed. With this end in view a meeting was held Monday evening, June 6th, at the residence of Dr. Trotter. After due consideration it was deemed advisable to form a club to be known as the Wolfville Art Association. The following officers were then elected: President—Miss Minnie Chipman; Vice-President—Mrs. Blain; Secretary—Mrs. C. L. Weeks; Treasurer—Mr. J. Herbin.

The first Monday evening of each month will be devoted to general business and Art Literature. The remaining Mondays of the class will meet at 2.30 in the afternoon for practical out door sketching. A cordial invitation is extended to all interested in the subject—practical workers, those who have been practical workers, and those who have not yet begun the study but are interested in the promotion of art in any or all of its phases—to join the Association next Monday afternoon, June 20th, at the home of Miss Hayes, when they will choose their sketching ground.
