Saturday evening at 8 o'clock a meeting will be held in the Baptist Church and will be addressed by Dr. D. L. Joshee, India; Mrs. J. E. Wilson, Fredericton; Rev. W. S. Tedford, Wolfville.

Sunday morning the preacher will be Rev. J. B. MacLaurin, son of the founder of Canadian Baptist Missions in India. Sunday afternoon at 4 the speakers will be Dr. (Miss) E. D'Prater, India, and Miss M. E. Harrison who is on furlow from the mission field. Sunday evening the speakers will be Rev. G. C. Warren, Fredericton, Dr. D'Prater and Rev. H. E. Stillwell, Toronto.

Dr. Joshee is a Telugu Christian who is visiting Canada for the first time. Dr. D'Prater has come from India at her own expense to participate in the Jubilee celebrations.

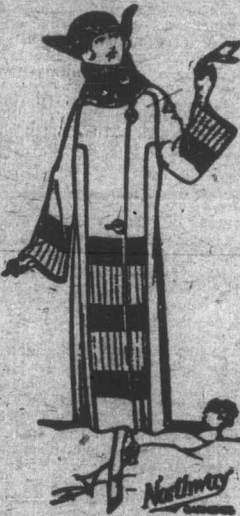
