



the common birch (Betula alba) have already an intrinsic value not second to many of the most valuable plants.

Even the leaves and young shoots secrete a resinous substance, having an acid reaction, which, under the long legged names of the pharmacist, is sold as a medical preparation for as high as \$16 per fluid ounce. The inner bark secretes a bitterish alkaloid not unlike cinchona in its nature, and is used largely as an adulterant for quinine in many parts of Europe. The so called "Cinchona Mixture" has been found by analysis to consist, in many instances, of the alkaloid found in the inner bark of the humble birch tree.

e outer bark, subjected to dry llation, yields a peculiar empyaatic oil having the peculiar odor cussia leather, and the secret of saring skins, and that, too, of the poorest quality of skins, being in from cattle that have perished have heaven desplate plains is the

facture. Only brief outlines can be given.

The birch limbs, twigs, bark and even the leaves, if a mere commercial oil is to be made, are gathered and placed in this large tub containing the coil for steam heating, and as fast as the mass accumulates it is kept covered with water, and the tub, being supplied with a tight fitting lid or manhole, should be opened as little as possible. After becoming nearly full, steam is turned on, and the batch kept about blood warm for twenty-four hours. This will dissolve nearly all the oil and resinous matters, which, being precipitated, causes the mass to assume a very sticky consistency. Steam may now be turned on, and the mass brought to a boil for a moment or two. With a wooden connection, with a small barrel or keg, the tank is made tight and brought to a boil; the steam, having previously dissolved the oils, etc., will now evaporize them and will condense in the last named keg. After a few hours the job is done, the keg is bunged or corked up, and is ready for shipment as commercial wintergreen oil, though made from birch refuse continually in the way.—

What stories of slow misery in the very shadow of death might be told by the dungeons that may be seen beneath the foundations of such castles as Warkworth or Kenilworth! There the well unrutured knight, like Damian de Lacy in "The Betrothed," shackled and ironed, although there was no possibility of escape, was doomed to solitary seclusion on the coarsest and scantiest food. Fettered in the damp and darkness among loathsome creeping things, he drew breath with difficulty in the foulest air; and it was fortunate for him that, like the cold blooded toads that were his fellow prisoners, undeveloped sensibility saved him from insanity.

The only access to those lonesome oubliettes was, as at Warkworth, through the trap door opening in the roof. What must have been the tone of mind of the chivalrous lord of the castle who could feast and carouse in the banquet hall above stairs with such horrors and such suffering beneath his feet! But what between hard fighting, free feasting and deep drinking the nobles of the Middle Ages seem to have kept conscience at arm's length, as they had become absolutely indifferent to the sufferings of their fellow creatures. There were rare exceptions to prove the rule. Some princes and wealthy nobles were piously inclined and munificent. They gave liberally in their life times, and made magnificent ecclesiastical foundations.—Blackwood's Magazine.
