## TEMPERATURE AMONGST THE INDIANS.

One of the greatest drawbacks to the  
civilization of the Indians, and at the same time  
one of the greatest causes of their degradation,  
is the liquor traffic, and that the Govern-  
ment of Canada has ever been  
conscientious of this fact is shown in the  
stringency of the laws which  
appear upon the statute books, relative to  
liquor traffic with the red man. We extract some remarks  
bearing upon the subject of our  
heading, from the last Annual Report  
of the Department of Indian Affairs.

The Superintendent General of this  
department, Sir John A. Macdonald, says:  
"It is much to be regretted that the liquor traffic  
has been carried on so extensively in the  
Lake of the Woods district, to the de-  
moralization of the Indians and prevention  
of the good results which would otherwise attend  
the efforts put forth to improve their  
condition,"—and in referring to the  
Montagnais of the Lower St. Lawrence,  
he says: "The Agent has been successful, I am happy to  
report, in putting a stop to the liquor  
traffic formerly carried on among them  
by unscrupulous traders, who would  
sell them whisky, and when they were under  
its influence frequently rob them of the  
products of their whole season's hunt."

Mr. G. B. Cherrier, Agent at  
Caughnawaga, reports:—"Taking  
everything together, one can safely  
say that the tribe is more prosperous.  
The well conducted people of the  
place applaud the wise measures  
taken by the Department to close  
up the taverns; no doubt drunken  
men may be seen on the streets,  
but they are few, and the liquor  
traffic at Caughnawaga, and there  
is much less disorder in the village,  
and one is not so often disturbed  
during the night by the shouts of  
drunkards."

Mr. John Davidson, Agent at  
Dundee in the same vicinity re-  
ports:—"When they earn a few  
dollars they are very often spent  
in that which is a curse to them,  
viz. in liquor. One of the Indians  
said to me a few days ago:—Some  
white folks think he'd best to stop  
us Indians from getting liquor, but  
we will get it, and the only way  
for the white folks to stop us,  
is for them to stop making it; it  
is certainly the cause. If it  
is not sold to them direct, they  
will always find some white man  
to get it for them."

Rev. O. C. Draper, Agent at  
Cross Point, P. Q., opposite Camp-  
bellton, N. B., writes:—"Consump-  
tion is the most prevalent disease  
here, and it has many victims each  
year. This may be due, in part, to  
the climate, but more to the influence  
of the abuse of alcoholic  
liquors, and this increases the  
disease more and more, especially  
among the young men."

L. Boucher, Indian Superin-  
tendent at Bethsiamet, opposite Ri-  
mouki, says:—"On my return  
from my lengthened visit to the  
lower posts, I found the Indians  
here in a state of excitement which  
might have led to fatal results.  
Many of them had crossed over to  
Rimouki on the south shore and  
got nearly all the liquor they wanted.  
Many of them returned in a  
state of intoxication. They shared  
their fire-water with those who re-  
mained at home. At one time,  
heated and urged on by the bad  
counsels of the traders who wished  
to raise trouble with the Agent,  
who found himself without pro-  
tection and deprived of all means  
of resistance against a revolt. My  
only recourse was to the moral in-  
fluence of the missionaries, but  
what can these gentlemen do  
against a drunken band. The In-  
dians are often deceived, especially  
when they have a glass of liquor  
in them. I learned from private  
letter that a trader sold a bottle of  
gin for \$20 to an Indian."

Rev. Thos. Butler, Indian Agent  
at Caledonia, near Liverpool, N. S.,  
writes:—"Liquor drinking is, I  
am happy to say, diminishing every  
year. I have not heard of one  
case of drunkenness here during  
the past year."

Rev. E. J. McCarthy, Agent at  
Chester, Lunenburg Co., N. S.,  
writes almost the same words.

Rev. Wm. Chisholm, Agent at  
Antigonish, N. S., reports:—"As a  
class the Indians are sober. There  
are but very few who are addicted  
to excessive drinking. The drunk-  
ard is looked down upon—he is heart-  
ily despised by his kin and  
brethren. It is remarkable that  
there are no Indian as drunkards as  
Bachus he cannot be induced by love  
or money to name the party from  
whom he had bought his drink."

Rev. John McDougall, Agent at  
Red Islands, Cape Breton, says:—"I  
find the Indians in my district  
generally very industrious,  
honest and temperate."

Mr. John O. Arceneult, Indian  
Supt. at Lennox Island, P. E. I.,  
writes:—"I am happy to be able  
to report that they continue to keep  
their temperance pledge which  
they took a few years ago. Some  
of them, however, especially those  
not living on the reserves, have not  
yet taken the pledge, and are still  
addicted to the use of liquor, but  
are seldom seen intoxicated, and  
of these there are not many."

Why may not the example of  
former temperance societies, given by  
Prince Edward Island be followed  
in those places throughout  
Canada where the agents have had  
so much trouble from this cause.  
We hope that many to whom the  
Liberal will be sent may profit by it.

We have taken a vast domain  
from the hands of its Aborigines,  
and in extending our peaceful con-  
quest, the Government has found it  
much easier to treat with them,  
than has the Government of the  
adjoining Empire. But while we  
give them Christianity, if we give  
them nothing in exchange for their  
pagan rites and ceremonies, they  
accept more readily than the  
required taste for intoxicants, we  
stand in a fearfully responsible  
position. We blame our Mother  
Country for her share in the opium  
trade with China, but do we not  
occupy pretty much the same posi-  
tion in relation to the liquor traffic  
with the Indians? True, we en-  
deavor to prevent it by stringent  
laws, but the above official state-  
ments speak for themselves. The  
Indians do not make the liquor—  
they must procure it either from  
us, or from our American neigh-  
bors with whom we stand side  
by side as exemplars to the Indians.  
There is therefore but one way to  
effectually prevent the evil. Shall  
we do it?

At a meeting of temperance work-  
ers held in Shaftsbury Hall, Toronto,  
a few evenings since, Hon. Edward  
Blake and others were present, and  
identifying himself with the temper-  
ance work. His remarks are here  
summarized for the Toronto World:  
Hon. E. Blake was received with  
loud applause. He had belonged for  
a number of years to the branch of  
temperance workers known as  
partial abstainers. He was not a  
total abstainer. He thought it was  
gratifying to view the changes which  
had taken place in the drinking cus-  
toms of the last few years, and he  
thought that before long drinking would  
be the exception rather than the custom.  
He did not object to represent the  
coercive legislation, but would prefer  
such a measure to result from strong  
popular opinion rather than a bare  
majority vote. He had still a  
large minority opposed. He had  
adopted total abstinence because he  
could not take upon himself to advise  
a man to do what he would not do  
himself. An elderly lady writes that  
she was only a partial abstainer. He  
hoped that the coffee house prin-  
ciple would be extended, and that  
those who are not total abstainers  
would at any rate refrain from the  
practice of treating.

A NEW SENSATION IN ENGLISH RE-  
LIGIOUS CIRCLES.—The going over to  
Rome by Sir Thomas Fyfe, his wife
