MORE PROTECTION.

THE ARGENTINE REPUBLIC RETALIATES AGAINST THE UNITED STATES.

BUENOS AIRES, Sept. 15.—The Ministry of Finance has sent to Congress a draft of the new retaliatory tariff against the United States, drawn along the lines advocated by President Uriburu in his latest message to Congress. There is no doubt the bill will become a law practically as it stands. The new tariff will increase the duty fifty per cent on those products not now on the free list and fifteen per cent on those which are on the free list. It will apply to those countries which have increased or may increase duties on Argentine products and is aimed directly at the United States.

GREAT FLOODS.

IN THE ORIENT DO A TREMENDOUS AMOUNT OF DAMAGE.

TAOCHIA, Wash., Sept. 15.—The Northern Pacific steamer Tacoma arrived yesterday, bringing Oriental advices up to Aug. 15. By the Orient floats in Nygata prefecture, over 100 houses have been destroyed and 56 lives lost in the Nishima district of the prefecture. A tremendous explosion occurred at the camp close to the Chinese arsenal of Kiangnan, near Shanghai. Forty bodies have been dug out of the debris. Two fine Krupp field guns, 1900, new pattern, single rifle and magazine rifles with 12,000 single rifle cartridges were destroyed.
