ASSESSMENT AND TAXATION

CANADA POINTS THE WAY.

From The Belleville Intelligencer: Canada is kinder to its returned soldiers than the United States, and he press across the line is not slow to express appreciation of the fair and honest treatment accorded the returned soldier by the Canadian Government.

Canada is paying its discharged soldiers a "war service gratuity" which amounts to \$100 a month for married men and \$70 a month for single men, for six months after leaving the service.

The United States meanwhile is discharging men without bonus, pay or allowances. It tells them in substance that it is through with them. Now they may go out and hustle jobs.

GRANTHAM COUNCIL

The Grantham Township Council met in the County Buildings at St. Catharines on Monday the 12th inst.

A communication was read from Frank Bowman of Grantham asking for that portion of the unopened road allowance leading from his place, be opened to Niagara Street and be improved, also that the necessary bridges be built.

A petition signed by a number of property owners in Niagara Gardens Sub-Division asking for a waterworks system be installed in their division.

A report from Township Engineer Rutherford was read in reference to it, giving approximately 6,530 feet of 4 inch main. A possible estimate of the cost would be \$11,634 which would be assessed against the frontage.

To finance this construction for a period of twenty years by the issuing of installment debentures would cost 11.6 cents per foot per year, for 20 years.

Added to the capital expenditures would be the cost of installing house services from the mains to the houses which would be, along with the cost of the amount of water consumed, entirely paid by the house holders and would not be chargeable against the vacant property.

An agreement between the City and the Township to build a concrete side walk on Carlton street was read.

Moved by Deputy Reeve Walker seconded by Councillor Baker that the communication of Mr. Frank Bowman re opening of road allowance and the building of Bridges, be laid over until the next regular meeting of the Council for further information. Carried.

Moved by Councillor Stewart seconded by Councillor Baker that the Reeve and Councillor Haynes be a committee to interview the City Council

to arrange for a supply of water for a waterworks system in Niagara Gardens Sub-division. Carried. Moved by Councillor Haynes seconded by Deputy Reeve Walker that the Reeve and Clerk be authorized to sign and seal agreement with the City of St. Catharines relating to construction of concrete side walk on the north side of Carlton Street from Lake Street to Ontario Street, and providing for assessing cost of same under the Local Improvement Act. Carried.

Moved by Deputy Reeve Walker seconded by Councillor Haynes that the County Treasurer be authorized to cancel the taxes on lot 958 Homeland Sub-division, it being a double assessment in the year 1916. Carried.

On motion of Councillor Haynes and Deputy Reeve Walker a number of accounts were passed.

Council adjourned to meet again at the same place on Monday, June the 9th as a Court of Revision of the assessment roll of 1919 and other business.

SAFETY ESSAY COMPETITION FOR 1919.

The Ontario Motor League has offered through the Ontario Safety League twelve cash prizes, totalling One Hundred Dollars, for compositions upon "How Children May Help to Avoid Motor Accidents."

The rules governing the contest are: 1 Any school child in Ontario may compete.

2 The composition may be either prose or verse and must be written in English. If prose, it must not consist of more than 150 words. If in verse it must be confined to 16 lines.

3 The composition must be the sole work of the pupil submitting it.

4 The composition must be written on ruled paper, with a margin on left side, and written in ink, and on one side of the paper only.

5 Neatness, spelling and general composition will be taken into consideration in award the prizes.

6 The full name, age and street address of the pupil must be written at the bottom of the paper.

7 The composition must be confined to the subject "How Children May Help to Avoid Motor Accidents."

8 The contest will close 16th June, 1919.

9 All papers are to be handed to the teacher, who will send them to the Principal to be forwarded to the League at the address below.

10 There will be two classes in the prizes offered.

(a) Scholars of 12 years and under.
(b) Scholars of 13 years and over.
The six prizes in each class will be:

- First \$5.00
Second \$10.00
Third \$10.00
Fourth \$5.00
Fifth \$5.00
Sixth \$2.00

The prize money will be forwarded to the winning contestants upon the opening of the schools in September.

Very valuable results have come from past competitions for much smaller prizes, and it is hoped that increased benefits to children may come from the 1919 contest.

It is expected that several of the leading Motor Clubs of the Province will also donate cash prizes for the schools in their districts. No prize-winner shall be eligible for more than one prize.

WOULD ABOLISH BOOKS AT HAVANA TRACAK

Liquerville, May 10—Former Congressman George W. Lott, owner of Papp and other good racers, who came here with the Harry Payne Whitney party, departed Sunday for Baltimore, where he will witness the racing there. In commenting on the rumored sale of the Havana track to himself and associates, he said "The deal is still pending and will probably be consummated before long. If we take over the property it is our intention to expand it in every possible way. There will be no purpose of less than \$750 value, and several stakes will be announced including two of \$10,000 added each. Ultimately it is our aim to make Havana the racing Mecca in winter and bring it to a Saratoga standard. Our earlier efforts might result in some losses but eventually it will prove a winner. If the track is taken over by us, there will be no dual system of betting as at present in vogue. The book-making system will be abolished and the mutual system used exclusively."

RETURNED MEN VENDORS

Under the direction of Mr. W. B. Cleland of Hamilton, arrangements for the taking over by the Government of liquor sales in Ontario, are proceeding rapidly and it is expected that the organization will be completed before the end of the month.
