The following is a copy of the most memorable judicial sentence which has ever been pronounced in the annals of the world, namely, that of death against the Saviour-with the remarks which the Journal Le Droit has collected, and knowledge of which must be interesting in the highest degree to every Christian. It is word for word as follows:

Senience pronounced by Pontius Pilate, intendent of the Lewer Provinces of Galilee, that Jesus of Nazareth shall suffer death by the cross.

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
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
