

Fashion's Fancies.

Silk and cashmere make a very good combination, and a cheap and effective imitation of these can be made in merino and good alpaca.

Three buttons on the blouse at the waist line, meeting three button holes in the belt of the skirt, make the best and simplest way of keeping the blouse and skirt together for people who have long waists with small hips.

Although any style of bonnet may be worn, yet as a rule, those cut up at the back to show the hair and trimmed high in the front are most favored.

Wooden balls of odd shape, covered with floss silk, are among the novelties. They are chosen of a lighter shade than the dress they are to adorn.

Plastrons of silk muslin or piece lace are laid in folds from the throat to the waist, where they are finished by the fan of lace or a bow of ribbon.

Tight sleeves, small at the wrists, make the hand look large. The cuff should be measured over the hand at the knuckles, instead of at the wrist.

Newmarket long coats with vests their whole length ago worn by Jaxaro girls, and are made of smooth cloth with astrakhan cloth or else fur trimming.

Stating costumes of dark green serge, or billiard cloth, have hat and jacket of the same material, and beaver and gray astrakhan are used for trimming.

Chantilly, Spanish, Edouard, light imitations of Mechlin and Brussels in a cream tone are much used on dresses with rich silk and velvet embroideries.

Gimpes of broadened on plain silk, embroidered tulle or silk muslin are worn with corset bodices. These gimpes may be plain, pleated or shirred, according to fashion.

Crash hats are made of corded silk in fashionable shapes, and are trimmed with lace and silk tulle arranged in front. These hats are also made to match traveling costumes.

Velvet featherings made up into wings and single plumes, embossed and outlined with gold. What a boon it would be to the poor little birds if they were universally adopted.

A flower pot filled with seaweed and curled hair was covered with plush fringed about the edge, which nearly covered the pot from view, and made a very pretty hair pin cushion.

Short women should have their dresses and mantles of the same color, as a wrap of a contrasting color seems to set the figure in two, and takes from the apparent height.

A very large bow of wide ribbon directly in front of the crown, or else a cluster of soft, full ostrich tips of the color of the felt, is the trimming for the latest fashion in vogues.

Girdles are again universally worn, or at least some kind of white at the wrists is necessary for a neat appearance, and jewellers have new cut pins for fastening the cuff in the sleeve's property.

The black wadded silk must used is that with waves two or three inches wide, in preference to the larger designs shown in articles of white at the wrists in striped satin and moire silk is chosen.

The elaborate French frocks for the smallest children are trimmed with white Angora wool lace on the collar and cape and the pleated skirt, and with skirts and hems of white watered ribbon.

Striped wool stuffs, made of the waste of fine wools are woven in stiff poplin like reps on purpose for petticoats, and are made up in lengthwise stripes or in cross stripes, as the wearer chooses.

Black cloth skirts with wide quilted satin border are liked because the quilted part supports the lower part of the skirt nicely, while the warm cloth clings closely to the upper part of the limbs.

A capote bonnet of dark brown broadened velvet has the brim covered with gold lace. Bows of white and golden brown ribbon velvet, arranged directly in front, form the trimming. The strings are of brown satin.

A toque of blue velvet is edged with a band of chinilla fur and ornamented with blue pommenerie disc and cords. The centre to accompany this is in the shape, gathered at the top, edged with the fur.

A tea gown in of faded rose plush. The fronts are edged with bands of plush of a darker shade, embroidered in gold in byzantine design. The folds at the back are held in position by bands of the same embroidery.

DOINGS AT OTTAWA.

Some of the Matters Said and Done in Parliament.

Mr. Cameron (Huron), thought the House was entitled to some explanation from the government as to the conduct of the revising officer. They had not simply the statement of an honorable man, but he had brought before them momentary proof showing that he was making no mistake in what he said.

They had proof that this revising officer rejected the applications notwithstanding they were in accordance with the spirit of the law and the letter too. The case of this officer was not an isolated one. In one case the revising officer refused absolutely to give one party any information as to what procedure would be followed when the lists would be closed.

Another officer told the solicitor of certain electors that if the names were in his hands by a certain day, it would be sufficient, and when they were put in his hands two weeks before that day he rejected them because too late, and so on.

Mr. Cameron said that he had many reasons to complain. The so-called revising barristers were comprised of people whom the members of the House and the country had got good right to complain of. The junior judges discharged the duties devolving upon them as well as could be expected, but there were many barriers in the way. But there were on the other hand many scandalous cases which he would bring to the attention of the house.

One declaration was refused because there was writing on the margin of the paper. Now it was known to everybody that all courts of justice would not take any exception to such a so-called mistake. There were other declarations which were refused, and which showed that it was political reasons that denied the petitioners just satisfaction. He showed some declarations, and said that several men were neglected from the fact that the writing was not good, yet he held that the writing was better than that of any of the ministers opposite.
