Open Session of Licensing Board.

We have already commended the action of the Licensing Board in inaugurating this year the practice of holding public sessions. The advantages of that course became evident last night during the discussion in open court of the merits of the applications for licenses against which objections have been raised. That discussion between contending counsel and members of the Board made manifest grave defects in the Act, which could not have been brought to light so strikingly in any other way. In the interest of both the licensees and the community further legislation is necessary.

Last night the Session opened at 8 o'clock in the Central District Court Room. Mayor Ellis presided and with him were Messrs. Martin and Blackwood. The Board followed counsel closely, and advanced points and queries for the expression of their views. Mr. Blackwood was particularly active in this direction.

There were a fair number of clergymen, publicans and the general public present and most of them remained till the Session was adjourned at 11.15. Among those were Rev. James Bell, Rev. J. K. Curtis, Rev. J. Bartlett, Lieut.-Col. Rees, Staff Capt. Cave and Editors Robinson and Lord.

The applications of A. D. Rankin &

Co., Fred Collins and Elizabeth O'Reilly were the first group taken.

A. D. RANKIN & CO.

Under this name an application was made for a license in respect of the premises of the late Mr. A. D. Rankin who held a license for many years. Sir J. S. Winter was instructed to oppose the application on behalf of the C. E. T. S. The objection was based on the contention that the Board had no power to grant this application. The original licensee died during the currency of the annual license. The license expired on his death, and Sir James argued that the only power possessed by the Board was to make an order such as would meet the merits of the case for the unexpired balance of the year for which the license ran, but that the Board had no power to grant another Annual License at the annual Licensing Session.

Mr. A. J. W. McNeilly, K. C., appeared for the applicant. He submitted that the Act recognized a quasi moral right to have a license already granted renewed, and that the latter part of section 16, viz., "In case of the insolvency or death of the person licensed, a Magistrate or the Board may make such order thereon as shall suit the circumstances of such case" expressly empowered the Board to continue not only for the unexpired balance of a year, but at the Licensing Session from year to year, a license in any case where the widow, orphans or other persons dependent on the estate of the deceased licensee would be deprived of support by the discontinuance of the license. In this case Mr. A. D. Rankin were dependent for support on the continuance of this license. The facts of the case were: Mr. Rankin was disabled by illness and could not carry on his business. He applied to the Board for a transfer of his license to A. D. Rankin & Co., under the management of Mr. Mulcahey, so that he and his might derive support from the business. The Board made the transfer. Later

A. D. Rankin & Co. for a consideration transferred the lease to Mr. Mulcahey who still traded under the firm name of A. D. Rankin & Co. Under the agreement Mr. Mulcahey can surrender the lease in the event of a discontinuance of the license without his fault or of the passing of local option. Under the agreement the widow and orphans of Mr. Rankin receive from Mulcahey \$800 a year. In the event of the Board discontinuing the license Mr. Rankin and her children will be deprived of their income. The spirit of the Act did not contemplate the perpetration of such hardship. Indeed it expressly provided against such a contingency.

F. COLLINS AND E. O'REILLY.

Sir James Winter opposed the applications by arguments similar to those he adduced in the former case. The original licensees were dead and the Board could not grant the applications of these applicants. Mr. W. J. Higgins appeared for the applicants. In addition to the arguments advanced by Mr. McNeilly in the Rankin application, which applied equally to these cases, he pointed out that the premises were among the oldest licensed premises in the city. In no sense could the application be regarded as new licenses within the meaning of the Act. The applicants were occupiers of the premises and the continuance was such as could be granted under Section 16. It would be a terrible hardship to deprive the next of kin of the deceased licensees of their means of support by refusing to continue the license.

MARY J. FLYNN.

Sir James opposed the application of Mary J. Flynn. The present holder was her husband. The license was granted to an individual and not to premises. The Board could only make a transfer in case of death or insolvency of licensee. This application came under neither head. The Board had no power to grant it.

Mr. Furlong, K. C., appeared for Mrs. Flynn. He said it was an old license held for very many years by the family of Mary Flynn. She herself had held the license for a great number of years. She had thought it better to have the license in the name of her husband for convenience of trade, but she had always owned the premises and stock. This year her husband had left the city and had not made an application for the license as usual. To retain her means of support she made the application in her own name for a license that had always been virtually hers. It would

be a monstrous injustice to deprive her of this license and her means of living.

JOHN KELLY.

Sir James Winter opposed this application on the ground that Torphy's was practically a new premises, and such as in the contemplation of the Act would mean a transfer to another premises, and that it could be made on the expiration of a lease. Mr. Furlong for the applicant said Torphy's was not a new premises. Alterations had 250 yards of a building had been done, but there was a law decision which he cited which showed that the licensing law did not regard such an alteration and rebuilding as constituting a new premises. It was strange that at one time Sir James Winter contended that in one application a license was personal and in this case that the person counted for nothing, it had all to do with the building. Sir James replied that the license was personal in regard to a particular premises.

T. J. ALLAN.

Sir James Winter opposed the application on the ground that the applicant had been convicted three times under the Licensing Act. Mr. Furlong for the applicant pointed out that the case of the conviction under the Licensing Act of 1906, and that the law did not empower the magistrate to withdraw the license. It would be making an injustice if the Board exacted a forfeiture which the law itself did not contemplate. The offence was not personal and was not the fact that Mr. Allan's health had not permitted him to exercise such a personal supervision as he could exercise now that he was in better health.

ELLIS & CO.

Sir James Winter opposed the application for a license on the ground that last year on two grounds, viz., (1) there was no notice as required by the Statute; and (2) the premises were without interest and a depreciation of value. He contended that the applicant had wrongfully obtained the license, either by wilful concealment of facts, or in some way the Board had been misled. In any case the Board could not exercise its power in granting the license, and should not continue it.

Mr. Furlong pointed out that Sir James was exercising a charge of fraud, and that it was incumbent on Sir James either to withdraw the charge or to proceed to prove it. He was prepared to meet and combat such a charge. Here ensued a long discussion. Mr. Furlong contended that Sir James was inviting the Board to interfere in making a decision in suggesting that the Board should review the decision of last year. It would introduce a precedent for a future review of existing licenses. From this would ensue a feeling of uncertainty as to the continuance of all existing licenses, and a disturbance of interest and a depreciation of value. The Act contemplated the continuance of original grants of licenses, which should not be disturbed unless there were compelling reasons for doing so. The power of veto in such a case was like that of the Governor. He was empowered to veto all of any bills presented to him, but could only exercise that extraordinary circumstance.

Mr. Squires appeared for the Methuene Conference to oppose the application. He contended that this application stood apart from all others. From the first knowledge of the granting of the license by the Board, opposition had been made. His position had been continued and had never ceased. It was not so in regard to other applications. This case was not like the others. The precedents established in this case would not affect the others. A monstrous wrong had been perpetrated in granting this license. By the schr Lydia Gertrude which arrived here yesterday from Groais Island, we learn that on Saturday last in the storm, while a high sea was running, two men named Jas. Clements and M. Broderick, narrowly escaped being drowned. They were coming from Conche to the Island when their boat was overtaken in the high sea running and both were left struggling in the water. They managed to cling to the inside of the boat but sea after sea swept over them and how they were not drowned is a mystery. For fully an hour they clung like this to the upturned boat and though men from the schr. saw them they could not put out in such a sea. Eventually man Leo Fitzgerald and Peter Brownie could not remain on the boat and were obliged to take a manning a boat after extreme peril to themselves and with great difficulty reached the shore. They were in a desperate plight when taken on board the boat, some of their nails were almost torn off from gripping the side of the boat, and several times the sea almost beat them clear off her. So weak were they after the rescue that they could not stand and had the men who had rescued them, they were both would have been drowned. When they went in the water both men had overcoats on but managed to get clear of them. They had thought it was a schooner's compass. Later their boat drifted ashore and was beaten in pieces.
