The Socialist Movement.

X. — WOMAN, THE HOME AND EDUCATION.

Mazzini speaking of woman:—"Blot out of your mind any idea of superiority to her; you have none whatever. The prejudice of ages has created the unequal education and the perennial oppression of the laws that appear intellectual inferiority which you use to-day as an argument for maintaining the oppression. There is no graver offence in God's sight than that which divides the human family into two classes and imposes or allows the subjection of one to the other. Before the one God and Father there is neither man nor woman, but the human being, the being in whom, under the aspect of man or of woman, those characters exist which distinguish humanity from the order of the animals; namely, social tendency, capacity of learning, and the faculty of progressing. Wherever these characters reveal themselves, there human nature exists, and in consequence equality of rights and of duties. No inequality exists between man and woman but, as often happens with two men, a difference of tendencies, of special vocations. Hold woman, then, as the companion and partner of your joys and sorrows. Hold her as your equal in civil and political life. The Mosaic Bible has said God created the man, and the woman from the man; but your Bible, the Bible of the Future shall say, God created Humanity, manifested in the woman and in the man."

The majority of Socialists, I find, are in favour of Woman's Suffrage, and in the Socialist state woman occupies an elevated position, and her right of vote.

The temporary setback the suffragists have suffered in England owing to "dear, delightful, illogical John Bull" rejecting a Bill which he read a second time last year, is not because the M. P.'s are not in favour of Woman's Suffrage, but that they desire to retaliate against the "window-smashers." While we deprecate some of the means which the ladies used, it is interesting to read that Mr. Gladstone has said in relation of disturbing the public repose: "I am sorry to say that if no instructions had ever been addressed in political crises to the people of this country, except to hate violence and love order and exercise patience, the liberties of this country would never have been attained."

A great deal has been made out of an ignorant charge that Socialism will destroy the Home, and the opponents of Socialism do not scruple to attach to the Movement extracts of isolated writers who have no more right to lead the whole Socialist party on the subject of marriage than an isolated Liberal or Tory would have to lead their respective parties on any question.

Socialism will make the home possible. It will create conditions under which children will grow up healthy and happy. Can you imagine what home-life there can be in the hundreds of wretched hovels in St. John's? Can you see the children there and imagine how impossible it is for them to grow in such conditions, to what God intended them to be?

Let those who say that Socialism will destroy the home first take the mote out of their own eye. Do they say that 50,000 divorcees in one year have anything to do with breaking up the home?

A clergyman of England speaking a few years ago said: "We must protest against the exaggerated, the unnatural, and the unnecessary luxury of the age, which is destructive of home life and of high ideals. In society domesticity is being gradually destroyed by the fashion of dining and living in hotels."

Education! What iniquities are committed in this name! What distorted

and cramped notions have we of this infinitude!

We have had a shaking up of 'dry bones' this winter, and if the C. H. E. is not abolished altogether it is in a fair way to be modified before another year. Whereat we say 'Amen'!

"Education seeks to discover and develop the innate powers of child-life; its work is to educate as well as to instill, to draw forth the actual from the possible, as well as to train the actual to shapeliness and use." I think I may take myself as an average product of our schools and I never heard while there of the above uses of Education, and it took about two years after I left school before I came to myself, and found how little use school had been to me, outside of knowing that 2 and 2 make 4.

With the exception of those who have wealthy parents, the great majority in the schools have no horizon beyond Water Street; they must earn money; whether the work suits them or not is secondary. They issue from school mere machines, with no object beyond material desires. Even what they have learnt is quickly upset when they enter an office and their arithmetical problems are reduced to simpler and quicker methods.

The political creed of Ruskin begins with "training schools for youth established, at Government cost, and under Government discipline, over the whole country; that every child born in the country should be permitted (and in certain cases be under penalty required) to pass through them; and that, in these schools, the child should (with other minor pieces of knowledge) imperatively be taught, with the best skill of teaching that the country could produce the following three things:—

- a.—The laws of health, and the exercises enjoined by them.
- b.—Habits of Gentleness and Justice.
- c.—The calling by which he is to live.

The Socialist intends that every child shall have its chance, that he will not go to work until he is educated and fitted as nearly as possible to the work which he will enjoy. Every child will have an equal opportunity for mental development, and in his maturer years the hours of work will be such that education can proceed all the time.

It is a disgrace that so few of our labourers and fishermen can read or write—not a disgrace to them but to the powers that be that can view such a condition so calmly. Every one of the Chinese can read and write and we call them heathen!

Most of these who have written on the social condition of Athens seem to agree that as a whole, the population of Athens was as superior to our modern civilization as we are to Australian savages.

How many "gems of purest ray serene" may not Education find among the poor?

"Ye sheep without a shepherd, claim your right to be fed, but claim more loudly your right to be holy, perfect and pure. Strange words to be used of working people: 'What! holy; these rough-jacketed, rough-worried persons; set to nameless and dishonoured service? Perfect! these, with dim eyes and cramped limbs, and slowly wakening minds? Pure—these with sensual desire and grovelling thought; foul of body and coarse of soul!'"

It may be so; nevertheless, such as they are, they are holiest, perfectest, purest persons the earth can at present show. They may be what you have said; but if so, they yet are holier than we, who have left them thus."

Rumors of Unrest in Navy.

LONDON, May 14.—According to the Daily Chronicle, the present unrest among the sailors in the British Navy, is due to dissatisfaction with the conditions of the service, especially in reference to pay and punishments.

This complaint has become so acute, that petty officers and men in the service are contemplating a breach of the King's regulations by forming themselves into a trades union.

The writer makes a long statement in this connection, which the paper prints conspicuously. He says it is time for the nation and the naval authorities to realize that if the Admiralty does not start immediately to reform the legitimate grievances of these 100,000, or if the country does not compel the authorities to measure out at least justice, the rank and file of the navy will form an association which will be strong enough which the industrial history of the last year or two has made the country painfully familiar.

Capt. Fitzpatrick, of the S. S. Portia, brought along news of the banking fleet. As usual Capt. John F. Lewis, fishing for Young, of St. Jacques, arrived at Placentia when the Portia was passing. He reported for 450 qtls. and he procured his catch on the southern end of the Quere Bank. Capt. Lewis reported bad weather. He is now re-baiting at Placentia and getting ready for his second trip. Bait is plentiful around Placentia at present and it is likely she will be off again for the Grand Banks in a day or two. No other banking arrivals were heard of. The schr. Shamrock, Capt. J. Daley, which was fishing on Cape St. George's Banks is now on her way to the home port. She hauled for 100 tubs which is equivalent to 120 qtls. The Shamrock is only a small vessel, carrying three dories.

When the Portia was at Sydney coaling there were four Newfoundland fishing vessels there. One of them was the Eureka, owned by Harris, of Grand Bank. She had 200 qtls. of cod aboard.
