## Opera Plans.

Further Discussed by Mr. Hesser. Edwin Bower Hesser, of the Boston Opera Company, writes that the aggregation of artists who will visit St. John's on Sept. 8th, 9th, and 10th, to give the first Grand Opera Festival in the history of the Colony have been definitely selected, and that it is even better than the one which toured Canada last year. This year it will be called the British North America Tour and if appreciation everywhere is as great as in the Maritime Provinces it will be made an annual coast-to-coast event in the future. The Provinces were very enthusiastic indeed, and if the interest of music lovers remains at the same pitch, the Festival will surely come each year.

The success of the Grand Opera Festival last season may be attested from the comment in the Halifax Chronicle and Echo of May 27th, as follows:—

"Halifax enjoyed its greatest musical treat in many years last night when the Boston Opera Company gave the first of the Grand Opera Festival events last night at the Academy of Music before a highly critical audience which was completely captured by the first number and greeted every subsequent selection with enthusiastic applause."

Another Halifax critic appeared in the Acadia Recorder, which said: "A feast of song—a soul-satisfying, magnificent, glorious! So splendid was the program given by the Boston Opera Co. last night at the Academy of Music, as star followed star, each one perfect in the exquisite numbers rendered, that the audience was stirred in a manner unusual to our rather cold audiences, and a storm of applause voiced the warmest appreciation of the splendid performance. The singers not only reached the highest expectations of the most critical, they have exceeded the most sanguine, and last night everyone was delighted beyond measure."

Mr. Hesser promises that this year and each year in the future he will see that the splendid reputation which was won the first year will be maintained. The repertoire finally decided upon, "Cavalleria Rusticana," "La Traviata," and "Don Pasquale," is certainly most attractive.

## Highlanders at Camp.

To-night a concert will be held at Carbonear by the Highlanders, who are now enjoying camp life. The lads will be assisted in the performance by ladies who left here by last evening's train. To-morrow the kilts will witness the Harbor Grace Regatta and will take part in the Brigade Race.

## "Fishermen of the Atlantic."

The 1913 issue of "Fishermen of the Atlantic," an annual which is published by the Fishing Masters' Association of Boston, has appeared in the trade. The book contains a complete list of fishing vessels along the Atlantic coast from Nova Scotia to Florida, and has much other information about the coast fisheries. Freeman C. Hardy, secretary of the association, is the editor of the publication.

A table of fishery losses since 1830 shows that 12 vessels were lost last year as against nine in 1911. While in the latter year 62 lives were lost in the fisheries, making 22 widows and leaving 40 fatherless children, but 45 lives were lost last year with 13 widows and 17 fatherless children.

The table shows that since 1830 a total of 306 vessels has been lost, with 5,460 lives. A more detailed table of last year's losses shows that two of the dozen ships were wrecked while on salt bank codfishing trips, two were haddocking vessels, four were returning from codfish trading trips to Newfoundland and Labrador, one was in the Newfoundland herring fishery and the other was an inshore gill netting boat.

The new South Boston fish wharf is given considerable space, its facilities being compared to those of T Wharf. At present, the annual statistics are engaged in bringing fish to T Wharf, this large fleet landing more than 100,000,000 lbs. of groundfish alone at the dock annually. The last portion of the book is devoted to a list of the fishing fleets. Arranged under their hailing ports, the name and description of every boat in the Atlantic fisheries is given, as well as the name of her owners or agents.—N. Y. Fishing Gazette.

## The Cook Stove



The cook stove is a horrible example of man's inhumanity to woman. Sometimes, when placed in the hands of a young bride who learned everything at college except how to hash brown potatoes, it becomes an object lesson of woman's inhumanity to man. The world is full of bilious husbands who married some prize winner in the Latin course, and woke up later to find that while she could pin the shoulders of a Greek cook to the mat three times out of five she didn't know whether a cook stove could be started from the east or had to be cranked with a half hitch.

In a newly established home which is filled with love and installment furniture the cook stove is used for the first few years as a domestic science experiment station. As nearly all cook stoves are made of sheet iron, they do not feel these experiments nearly so much as the rest of the family. If there were more sheet-iron stomachs in existence, there would be fewer round trip tickets sold to Reno, Nevada, with six months' stop-over.

The cook stove is a simple affair, and seldom requires any more care than a six-cylinder automobile. It is so constructed that anyone can start a fire in it the first time by the simple expedient of substituting gasoline for kerosene. As a rule, the cook stove has to be fired up every morning, and this is a wisely duty which should be included in the marriage ritual along with love, cherish and obey. Failure to attend to this, on the part of encephalated and short-sighted bridegrooms, often results in the mournful spectacle of emittiered huddles leaving a warm bed at an unearthly hour and groping around in a repulchral wood-shed after kindling in their pajamas.

One of the principal functions of the cook stove is to heat water for the bath room. It discharges this function with great enthusiasm for the member of the family who gets to the bath tub first, after which it yields an icy product that would build chilblains on an Antarctic explorer. In summer the cook stove does not heat water or anything else, which accounts for the increasing popularity of the bathing beach and the four-minute sponge off.

## Extreme Heat Detrimental to Fish.

Messrs. Lind and Conto, of Oporto, wrote to the Board of Trade as follows: "The consumption of British fish is less active this week. We had hoped that stocks of the old fish would have been all sold before the arrival of the new fish, but the arrival of the Antoinette with another cargo of old cure upset our calculations and now that the Annie E. Banks and Little Mystery have arrived with mixed cargoes of new and old, this latter quality will doubtless have to suffer a further reduction in prices in order to facilitate sales. Prices opened for new fish are relatively high, but the sale is dull. The stocks of Norwegian and other qualities are fairly heavy for this time of the year, and the demand is not very brisk. We have been having very warm weather since the beginning of the month, in fact we have to go back to 1876 to find records of such a heat in the month of July. It has been very detrimental to the old fish."

## Plenty Squid at Carbonear.

At present the southwest coast is dotted with bankers who are looking for a squid baiting. Word has just been received that squid are very plentiful at Carbonear, the fish having struck in there on Sunday evening. Bankers seeking bait can be supplied at Carbonear.

## Dutchess Report.

The Reid Nfld. Company had this message last night from Captain Parsons, of the s.s. Duchess of Marlborough, which reached Lewisporte at nine o'clock last night:

"Fine weather going to Battle Harbour. Returning, N. and N.E. winds. Fishery poor; trapping is practically over; hook and line doing a little at a few places."
