There passed away at her late residence on Rennie's Mill Road, yesterday afternoon, a prominent lady in the person of Mrs. G. J. Carter. Mrs. Carter was an exemplary churchwoman, and was a familiar figure in all social and philanthropic circles. She was formerly Miss Bird, of Boston, and leaves three children, Dr. E. B. Mulloney, of Halifax, and Miss Laura and Fred who reside at home, she leaves one sister, Mrs. Doty, of Boston.
