A test was made yesterday to de-termine the leakage from the new system of mains. About nine thousand feet of the 20 inch main, 2000 feet of 16 inch, 2650 feet of 8 inch main was put a pressure of about 75 lbs., per square inch. The leakage was found to be about 3000 gallons per day. A water distribution system can never be made absolutely tight. Some leakage must always be anticipated under the best conditions.
