The New Loan.

The new loan introduced by the Minister of Finance in the House of Assembly yesterday afternoon, provides for the raising of the sum of \$6,000,000 for a period of twenty years, the interest being 5½ per cent per annum. This loan the Minister explained will be used toward retiring the loan of \$5,000,000 due on the 30th day of June next; to naval and military purposes and to the improvement and construction of public works. The estimated expenditures under the latter head are: \$250,000 for a new wing to Fever Hospital; \$50,000 for additions to Court House and Public Works Building; \$50,000 for improvements to Empire Building, which was taken over to provide extra hospital accommodation for soldiers returning from overseas in need of medical treatment; \$50,000 for an addition to the Bowcock's Farm Sanatorium. After these expenditures have been met there will be a balance in hand, out of the new loan, of \$5,000,000, which added to the sum in credit from last year's Victory loan, will be sufficient to meet all the war obligations outstanding. The Militia department estimates these debts at a total sum of \$4,472,500, carried as follows: Pay due soldiers still in England \$500,000; Regimental Pay due here \$340,000; Transportation \$300,000; Board and Mess Expenses \$140,000; Hospital Charges \$30,000; Printing and Stationery \$7,500; Estates of Soldiers, \$40,000; Re-establishment \$75,000; Civilian Clothing for Soldiers, in lieu of \$225,000; Allowances \$475,000; Separation Allowances, all accounts, \$320,000; Gratuity for War Service, \$1,450,000; Royal Naval Reservists Pay Augmentation, \$750,000; Clothing Allowance R.N.R., \$100,000. Adding this expenditure to that already disbursed will bring the Colony's war bill to a sum approximating fourteen million dollars, an average outlay of about \$3,500,000 per year for the period.

There is also a debt of \$1,866,666, due the Imperial Government, covering a sum borrowed on executive responsibility only, for which the Dominion is paying 5 p.c. interest. Apparently no provision has been made to wipe off or protect this.

Under the proposed new loan, \$5,000,000, of which are to be raised abroad and \$1,000,000 locally, the annual obligations of Newfoundland will be increased some \$80,000, made by the interest on the extra million and the additional half of one per cent on the total loan. Financially, we are going some these days.

Observed at the Houses.

The details furnished yesterday re the purchase of the Empire Building were illuminating. We note that the generous leader of the Government received \$3,000.00, a paltry sum, for building an annex and fixing up the building for occupation. Heating apparatus, too. Another \$3,950.00 for Mr. Phil Moore & Co. Plumbing is great work when you have a Government behind you, and of course Phil knows all about that. By the way, why use the old trick, \$3,950.00. Why not say \$4,000.00. Surely the conscience did not prick at the thought of adding \$50.00 extra for superintendence.

We note, too, that in the Council Mr. Ellis did not agree with the plan of Mr. Anderson in the housing solution. The reason is plain. The leader of the Government wants some plan of his own formulation that will give to him the credit so that a few more thousands may be added to his small income from Government contracts.

The Premier had a very scholastic air about him yesterday. Moreover he hates to be questioned, and apparently he must be suffering some acute chagrin these days as his equanimity is generally not as smooth as that of a skilled diplomat is purported to be.

The "wordy" President was not in his accustomed place, and consequently the House appeared somewhat at a disadvantage, for it is a well known fact that the President is often the "cynosure of neighbouring eyes," as it is never a matter of certainty what may proceed from the mine of his inexhaustible store of wisdom.—M. P.

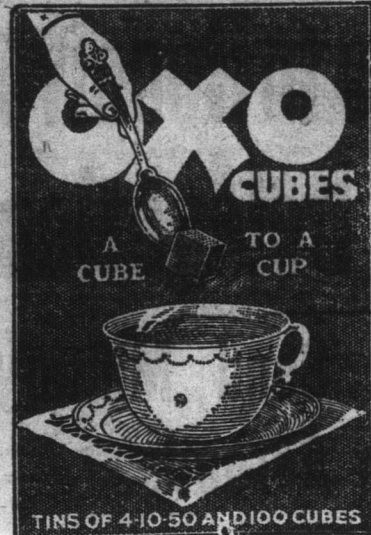

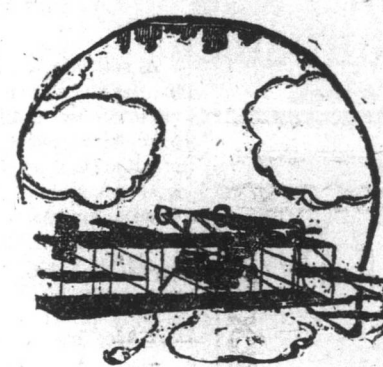
