#### BANS TOBACCO FOR MINISTERS.

TORONTO, Oct. 13.—No more shall the ministers of the Methodist church in Canada indulge in the habit of smoking. This was decided last night by the delegates of the General Methodist Conference when they approved a memorial presented by Rev. W. E. Millson, of London, Ontario, to reinstate in the book of discipline examination from the words "and will continue to abstain therefrom," so that when a probationer about to enter the ministry is being exhorted to abstain from the use of tobacco it shall be incumbent upon him to answer this question in a positive manner.

Some years ago the committee on the course of study dropped the question from the discipline, but since that time there has been an outcry in many sections of the church against the habit of smoking by some ministers of the church, so that when the motion of Rev. Mr. Millson was presented to the conference it met with ready support.

### Provincial Synod of Canada.

#### MEETING IN HALIFAX TO-DAY.

The Provincial Synod of the Church of England in Canada, representing the Eastern Ecclesiastical Province, comprising the dioceses of Montreal, Quebec, Fredericton and Nova Scotia, of which Archbishop Worrell, of Nova Scotia is metropolitan is in session at Halifax to-day. Twelve leading clergymen from each of the four dioceses named, accompanied by twelve of the most prominent laymen of each are in Halifax to attend. The Archbishop is Chairman of the House of Bishops, the personnel being Bishop Farthing (Montreal), Bishop Richardson (Fredericton) and Bishop Lennox-Williams (Quebec).

STOCKHOLM.—Charles XII, perhaps the greatest national hero of Sweden's history, and in his time one of the most feared warriors of Europe—he was killed in 1718—will again arise before the eyes of his many admirers—this time on the silver screen. A corporation is now being formed for the production of a film depicting the outstanding events of the meteoric military and political career of this Swedish idol who, taking the field in person, conquered the Russians on one hand and the Danes on the other, and was killed in action at the age of 36. The taking of this film is inspired mainly by patriotic motives. The capital needed for the production is already fully subscribed and the work will begin without delay.

### Home at Humbermouth.

#### RETURN TRIP STORMY.

The Straits steamer Home arrived at Humbermouth yesterday, having made all parts of call going North, to St. John's. On the return trip, the Home had to pass Daniel's Harbor and Parson's Pond, as weather conditions were such that it was impossible to make these ports. The ship, which brought a full load of freight, reports all the fishermen off on that side of Labrador. The Home leaves Humbermouth again on Wednesday afternoon and passengers who leave by to-day's express will connect.

### Fined for Trawling.

The fishermen of English Ht., unable to catch fish with hook and line, took to the use of trawls, which formerly they had had forbidden by law, and were hauled before Magistrate Somerton of Trinity. He imposed a small fine and forbade the further use of trawls. The fishing at English Harbor was very poor and good catches could only be made with trawls.

### Cape North Light Keeper Reports.

#### Says Saw No Ship Founder—Collar Nevada Only Steamer to Pass Station.

"That the lighthouse keeper at Cape North saw no steamer foundering off his station on last Thursday and that the collar Nevada was the only ship to pass between one and two o'clock on that day was the information contained in a telegram received yesterday by G. H. Harvey, Marine and Fisheries Agent from Mr. McAskill, keeper of the Cape North Light, says the Morning Chronicle, Halifax, of Saturday last.

When reports circulated several days ago of a big freighter foundering two miles off Cape North, Mr. Harvey wired the lighthouse keeper, but only received a reply yesterday, the delay being due to wire trouble. The reply was as follows:

"Heard rumors a few days ago of steamer foundering off this station on 5th inst. Saw no steamer pass inward on that date. Steamer Nevada passed outward between one and two p.m. on that date. It was blowing a strong gale from northwest. Weather was clear."

According to despatches from Sydney a party of fishermen stated that they saw a large inward bound steamer founder several miles off Cape North at 2 p.m. on Oct. 5. As yet no steamer has been listed as missing and the lighthouse keeper's report is taken to indicate that no tragedy has occurred.

### LLOYD'S AGENT STILL POSITIVE.

Sydney, N.S., Oct. 13.—"I am convinced that another terrible and mystifying marine tragedy has taken place, although we may never know the name of the ship nor whence she came."

This is the expressed opinion of Joseph Salter, veteran agent of Lloyd's in Cape Breton, concerning the reported sinking of a large steamer last Thursday afternoon, two miles off Cape North. ### Rabbi Wise.

#### SAYS AMERICA MUST CURE EUROPE—FINDS FEAR RULES WORLD.

Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, addressing the first of the season's Sunday morning services of the Free Synagogue at Carnegie Hall on "What's the Matter with Europe and Has America Any Duty?" describes the panic of fear in which he found Europe on his recent trip abroad, and urged America to help put Europe on its feet.

"War has not been followed by the moral upliftment that has been expected," he said, "but by continent-wide demoralization. Europe feels disappointed, cheated, bereft, Austria of territory, Germany of victory, France of reparations, and England of less ponderable things, of imperial peace. Everywhere there is a sense of having invested all in a lottery and having drawn blanks, with the Central European powers imagining that the Allies have won the prizes.

Observing that an almost universal feeling existed that the late war was not the last war, Europe is obsessed by fear. Not hate, but fear, rules the world. The disappointment and sense of fear in France are deeper to-day than before the war. The entire policy of France is formed by fear rather than bitterness. France dreads the rise of Germany again to power and Germany's indubitable will to vengeance. The word 'fear' is blazoned across the skies of Europe.

"Peoples are being dragged down by fear to the abyssal depths of unreason. If only fear and disappointment might be utilized by penitence, but penitence is nowhere to be found. There are sorrow and regret and disappointment and disenchantment, but no sense of contrition—least of all in Central Europe, which is untouched by a sense of guilt."

"Europe is sick unto death," he continued. "We are to be Europe's physician. But while we are to exercise the judgment of the physician as to the best and most helpful medicine, it is the business of America to remember that Europe is inhabited neither by races of lunatics nor criminals. Europe is a sick child and not yet bereft of reason. With America alone sane and capable of healing, Europe has borne the burden and we have borne a lesser burden, so that humility must prevail in the American counsels if we are to help Europe through America still."

"The supremely important thing is not to cancel the debts of Europe to America, but to cancel America's attitude of remoteness and indifference. We might cancel every debt and not help Europe at all. We might refuse to cancel debts and still help greatly. Europe needs more than American money. America must first put aside the bitter spirit of partisanship which panders to the dictates of self."

### Chanak Itself an Eastern Gibraltar.

#### BRITISH OFFICERS IN CHARGE THERE REGARD THEIR POSITIONS AS IMPREGNABLE.

CHANAK, Asia Minor, Oct. 7.—"We are only three weeks old, but already have the strength of Gibraltar," said a British Captain, who escorted the Associated Press correspondent ashore at Chanak this morning.

It is exactly three weeks since preparations for the defence of Chanak were begun, and in that time this straggle village of white-walled houses has become the centre of one of the most formidable fortresses in the world. Evidence of Great Britain's preparations for whatever may happen in the Near East greets the visitor on all sides, and the officers in charge, who are all veterans of the World War, declare that no defensive positions on the west front were more nearly impregnable.

From the harbor, where a dozen freighters, and transports swing at anchor, there is little to be seen except a few gaunt earthworks and hospital buildings to the east of the town. Here and there along the hillside are groups of white tents, and the long white highway which winds across the town and disappears among the steeply sloping hills is dotted with army trucks, mule wagons and other transport. But the real defences are back from the town in the rocky valleys, protected from prying eyes.

The British have landed 200 pieces of artillery since the work of preparation began three weeks ago, of which the largest guns are of more than thirteen calibre. These supplement the practically unlimited number of guns which can be brought into action from the water if a wireless call goes forth to the fleet, now resting in scattered units along the Straits and in adjacent waters.

"Opposite Chanak, along the European shore, is a little group of destroyers, and an odd-looking vessel like the old pictures of Noah's Ark, which proves to be the airplane carrier Argus. From the great platform built above decks airplanes are launched from time to time, going north on winged patrol up and down the Kemal line, whence they bring back hourly new photographs enabling the British commanders to keep their maps of the Turkish preparations up to the minute.

The Argus carries twenty-one airplanes, embracing all types, together with necessary workshops for keeping them always in fighting trim. In other branches of the service the Chanak post is equally well equipped. It has the most modern encampments, hospitals and canteens, as well as canteens in artillery, machine guns and repeating rifles. The morale of the British soldier is a smart and satisfactory as their equipment, and they are obviously ready for war. Their appearance contrasts strangely with that of the sturdy Kemal troops beyond the hills, who are nondescript in apparel and equipment and are said to carry different varieties of rifles. The scene at night in the district adjoining the Straits is spectacular.
