GERALD SIFTON ON TRIAL

Charged With Deliberately Beating His Father to Death.

A Jury Secured After 33 Men Had Been Called For Service-Crown Scores First Victory and Jury Will Visit the Scene of the Tragedy-R. C. Clute, K.C., Opened the Case For the Crown, Which Has Subpoensed 51 Witnesses.

London, Nov. 4 .- In the presence o a large crowd Gerald Sifton yester-day afternoon began his third fight for life, Many women were present, and the greatest interest was mani-fested in the man charged with defested in the man charged with de-liberately beating his father to death in order to secure his small fortune. Judge Britton showed a disposition to hurry the case, and a jury was secured after 33 men had been called. Much progress was was made in spite of the fact that an adjournment was taken at 5 o'clock. adjournment was taken at 5 o'clock The following are the jurymen: E. Thomas, Dougald Gillies, F. Ryan, Henry Rismele, W. Howlett, David Wood, George

Howlett, David wood, George I. Stephenson, Robert Patterson, William Sutherland, Andrew Gardiner, William Ellwood, S. K. McRae.

CANADIAN PREFERENCE N.G.

So Answered Mr. Chamberlain When Asked For Quid Pro Quo.

Sir Wilfrid Urged at the Colonial Conference That His Preferential Treatment of British Manufactures Merited a Substantial Return in Exemption of Canadian Exports of Food- Products From New Duties.

London, Nov. 4.—The blue book on the Colonial Conference does not add much to what is already Lnown. The

much to what is already known. The resolution on the subject of preferential trade is the most interesting part of the report to America.

In that resolution the conference recognizes that preferential trade between the United Kingdom and the colonies would stimulate and facilitate commerce and strengthen the Empire; that in the present circumstances of the colonies it would cumstances of the colonies it would not be practicable to adopt a gen-eral system of free trade; that with a view, however, to promoting an increase of trade within the Empire, it is desirable that those colonies which have not already adopted such a policy should, as far as their circumstances permit, give substantial preferential treatment to the products and manufactures of the Unit-

ed Kingdom.

Four Premiers urge an Imperial grant to colonial products and man-ufactures, giving preferential treat-ment in the United Kingdom by ex-emption from or reduction of duties. Five Premiers present at the con-ference undertake to submit to their respective governments at the carli-est opportunity a request that such measures be taken as may be neces-sary to give effect to the principle of this resolution.

this resolution.

A memorandum from the president of the Board of Trade shows that the premiers were prepared to recommend preferential treatment

Canada—The existing preference of 33 1-3 per cent., and an additional preference on selected articles, by reducing the duties in favor of the United Kingdom, raising duties on foreign imports and placing on certain foreign imports now New Zealand—Ten per cent round, reduction on present duties on British goods.

Cape Colony and Natal—Twenty-five pre cent. preference on British goods.

Australia was not in a position to define the extent of the preference to be given.
Another resolution emphasizes the

desirability of considering the refusal of the privileges of the coasting trade, including trade between the United Kingdom and the Colonies, and between the colo-United Kingdom and the Colonies, and between the colonies, to countries wherein corresponding trade is carried in ships of their own nationality.

The conference also adopted resolu-

tions advocating the use of the metric system; the reservation by the Government in future agreements; of the right to purchase cables, and the insertion in the new shipping agreements of provisions to prevent ex-cessive freight charges or any prefer-ence in favor of foreigners. The blue book shows, also, that

owing to differences of opinion among owing to differences of opinion among the different colonies no decision was reached on the question of Imperial military defences. Secretary for War Brodrick, in a speech in which he urged the colonies to perfect their military forces, insisted that it would never do, in any future war, to count on having an enemy likely to chable Great Britain to make up dring hostilities the deficiencies d ring hostilities the deficiencies found at the start.

The radical attitude of the Canadian Ministers in favor of preferential trade was thown throughout the conference. The Canadians definitely urged upon Colonial Secretary Cham-berlain, that, in consideration of the satstantial preferences given by Can-ada to the products of Great Britain, Canadian exports of food products ought to be exempted from the duties imposed this year by Great Britain
Mr. Chamberlain did not agree to
this proposal; he said he did not be that there would follow material result to the trade of the United Kingdom on account of the granting of preferential trade by Canada, great as the Canadian Ministers claimed this trade to be, and he declined to agree to such a departure from the fiscal policy of the Empire. One of the Canadian Ministers pre-

sent at the recent colonial conference is credited with the statement Mr. Chamberlain, himself, was in fav-or of an inter-Imperial preference, but had said: "One of the greatest sorhad said: "One of the greatest sor-rows I have had in my political ca-reer is that not another man in the Cabinet agrees with me in my Im-parial hopes." perial hopes.

Mr. Tarte's name was struck off the books of those public men who respect the constitution because he thought he could speak of a suitable fiscal policy for Canada.
