The investigation before the coroner's jury with regard to the death of the late Harry D. Platt, killed at Labatt's brewery on Wednesday afternoon, was held Friday evening at the police station and lasted four hours. A large crowd remained throughout the proceedings. Anthony Mansell, held on a charge of manslaughter in connection with the lamentable affair, occupied a seat at the table, and naturally evinced the greatest interest in the testimony. On one or two occasions he was silenced by his counsel for some impatient outbreaks, but on the whole listened quietly enough and maintained a composed countenance. His wife was also present. The prisoner's interests were looked after by Messrs. Meredith, Cameron & Judd, while Mr. McKillop represented the Crown.

THE EVIDENCE.

Dennis Mason, the head brewer, was the first witness. He said deceased had been employed at the brewery for about four years and was assistant brewer.
