Six Years of Faithful Work Show Good Results.

Attendance Doubled and Standard Raised From Lowest to Highest.

The Pupils' Fees - Scholarships Suggested-Changes in Public School Teaching Staff-Collections for the New Hospital.

The work of Mr. F. W. Merchant as principal of the Collegiate Institute was substantially recognized by the Board of Education at their regular meeting last night, all the members being present.

Merchant's salary be adjusted to \$2,-200 per annum, laid the matter before the board. He said there appeared to be a strong feeling among the public against the raising of salaries, a feel-ing for which there might be some ground, but in this case it was a matter of justice pure and simple. A comparison between the report of the in-stitute for 1890, the year preceding Mr. Merchant's charge, with that of 1896, could not be made, as none had been given for 1890, but the history of the school up to 1891 was not what could be desired. Pupils passed through the city to attend the Strathroy school. The annual report for 1891 shows a total on roll of 557, of which 494 were city pupils, 54 from Middlesex county and 5 from other counties. The 1896 report shows 973 pupils on the roll, of which 757 were from the city, 154 from Middlesex county, and from outside counties 23. The attendance had doubled and more than 100 outsiders, from whom the board received \$10 each, had been induced to come to the city. In 1891 the board offered a teacher \$2,100.
