

# ECHOES OF THE

Steamer Athabaska Had a Rough Experience.

Lumber-Laden Barge Lest-Icebergs Sighted on the Atlantic.

Owen Sound, Ont., Sept. 19.-The Canadian Pacific Line steamer Athabasca (Capt. George McDougall) arrived here vesterday from Fort William, after encountering on Lake Superior one of the heaviest gales of the season. The steamer was obliged to lay seven hours under cover off Keewenawan Point. So

steamer was obliged to lay seven hours under cover off Keewenawan Point. So severe was the storm that the two stays to the forward mast were sprung. Sceres of vessels took shelter under the White Fish point. So far as could be learned no wrecks have been reported. The Athabasca had on board 55 first class transcontinental passengers, all of whom are loud in their praise of the excellent seamanship displayed by Capt. McDougall and his officers.

Alpena, Mich., Sept. 18.—Lightkepeer Garrity, of the Presque Isle light, early today sighted the lumber-laden barge C. W. Wesley, water-logged and drifting down Lake Huron in the heavy gale that was blowing. The Wesley drifted ashore near the light, and will be a total loss. The crew of the barge were taken off by the tug Castle.

Harbor Beach, Mich., Sept. 18.—The Canadian steamer Bannockburn was released from the beach yesterday noon, leaking slightly in one compartment. She will resume her voyage.

Fort William, Sept. 18.—The overdue steamers City of Collingwood and Manitoba got here last night after going through one of the worst storms ever seen on Lake Superior. The Collingwood laid up under Keewenawan Point on Sunday morning, and stayed there until 8 o'clock yesterday morning. The Manitoba, after plunging in the teeth of the storm for several hours on Sunday, making only one knot per hour, laid up at Michipicoten Island. Capt. Bassett, of the Collingwood, reports coming through a quantity of wreckage, consisting of the bulwarks and part of the cabin of a freight steamer.

Quebec, Sept. 18.—H.M.S. Indefatigable, on her way to Montreal, went aground near the site of the future Quebec bridge, on the Quebec side of the river, about 3:30 a.m. She was successfully put affoat two hours after by the wrecking boats of Mr. Davis, but it was found that she had been considerably damaged. After having been thoroughly examined, the vessel was put in the graving dock at St. Josephs to be immediately repaired.

FLAT ON HIS BACK. New York, Sept. 19.—Sir Thomas Lipton is on the flat of his back on the tender Porto Rico, Sandy Hook. He slipped on the Erin's steam launch on Monday, and sprained his ankle. The shock was considerable. Dr. Mackay, his physician, insisted he must lie up for repairs.

ONLY FIVE RECRUITS.

THE UNITED STATES CABINET. Washington, Sept. 18.—It was stated on excellent authority today that all the members of the cabinet had accepted the reappointment tendered by President Roosevelt yesterday. The manner in which the president made the tender rendered it almost impossible to take any other course, as the members were already in the positions and could not decline, but must resign their portfolios themselves if they desired to leave the cabinet. More than this, they all believe in the sincerity of the president in desiring their services, and in return they wish to assist him to the full extent of the late President McKinley, which Mr. Roosevelt has adopted for his administration.
