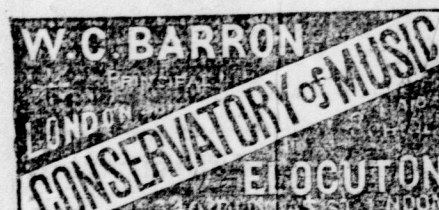

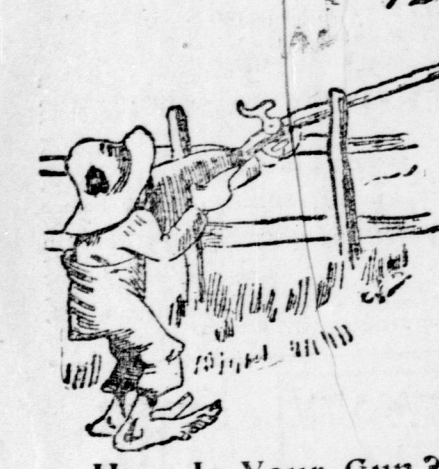

ECHOES OF THE RECENT STORM

Steamer Athabaska Had a Rough Experience.

Lumber-Laden Barge Lost—Losses Sighted on the Atlantic.

Owen Sound, Ont., Sept. 19.—The Canadian Pacific liner steamer Athabaska (Capt. George McDougall) arrived here yesterday from Fort William, after encountering on Lake Superior one of the heaviest gales of the season. The steamer was obliged to lay seven hours under cover off Keweenaw Point. So severe was the storm that the two stays to the forward mast were sprung. Scores of vessels took shelter under the White Fish Point lighthouse as could be learned from wrecks have been reported. The Athabaska had on board 55 first class transcontinental passengers, all of whom are loud in their praise of the excellent seamanship displayed by Capt. McDougall and his officers.

Alpena, Mich., Sept. 18.—Lightkeeper Garity, of the Presque Isle light, early today sighted the lumber-laden barge C. W. Vesley, water-logged and drifting down Lake Huron in the heavy gale that was blowing. The Vesley drifted ashore near the light, and will be a total loss. The crew of the barge were taken off by the tug Castle.

Harbor Beach, Mich., Sept. 18.—The Canadian steamer Bannockburn was released from the beach yesterday noon, looking slightly in one compartment. She was under way.

Port William, Sept. 18.—The overdue steamers City of Collingwood and Manitoulin, which were sighted yesterday evening on Lake Superior, the Collingwood and up and Keweenaw Point on Sunday morning, and stayed there until 8 o'clock yesterday morning. The Manitoulin, after plunging into the teeth of the storm for several hours on Sunday, making only one knot per hour, laid up at Michipicoten Island. Capt. Bassett, of the Collingwood, reports coming through a quantity of wreckage, consisting of the masts and part of the cabin of a freight steamer.

Quebec, Sept. 18.—H.M.S. Indefatigable, on her way to Montreal, went aground near the site of the future Quebec bridge, on the Quebec side of the river, about 3:30 a.m. She was successfully put afloat two hours after by the wrecking boats of Mr. Davis, but was found that she had been considerably damaged. After having been thoroughly examined, the vessel was put in the graving dock at St. Joseph's to be immediately repaired.

Father Point, Sept. 18.—The steamship Line, from Bristol Inward (Capt. Shell drake), reports having met an iceberg in the track of vessels near Belle Isle, and considered very dangerous on dark, rainy nights.

FLAT ON HIS BACK.

New York Sept. 19.—St. Thomas Lipton is on the flat of his back on the tender Porto Rico, Sandy Hook. He slipped on the Erie steam launch on Monday, and sprained his ankle. The shock was considerable. Dr. Mackay, his physician, insisted he must lie up for repairs.

ONLY FIVE RECRUITS.

Toronto, Sept. 19.—It was the intention of the authorities to raise 150 men for garrison duty in the Grand Battalion, R. C. R. I., at Halifax. Recruiting was opened at Stanley Barracks on Saturday morning, and only five recruits were accepted. There were about 30 applicants, but the remainder were refused on account of being undersized or medically unfit for duty.

THE UNITED STATES CABINET.

Washington, Sept. 18.—It was stated on excellent authority today that all members of the cabinet had accepted the appointment tendered by President Roosevelt yesterday. The manner in which the president made the tender rendered it almost impossible to take any other course, as the members were already in the positions and could not decline, but must resign their portfolios.

More than this, they all be desirous of their services, and in return they wish to assist him to the full extent of their power to carry out the policies of the late President McKinley, which Mr. Roosevelt has adopted for his administration. Another feature of the relations of the new president with the cabinet, which has been known today, to the effect that Mr. Roosevelt had been fully advised and had approved of the negotiations in progress relative to the proposed Ishmian Canal treaty with England.
