

TRUSTEE GAMMAGE NAMES THE SCHOOLS

In Which He Would Like to See Manual Training Inaugurated.

It is the intention of Trustee W. W. Gammage that manual training could be inaugurated in the public schools, or three centres, at least, in time to be operated after the summer holidays.

The three centres he had in mind were St. George's, Lorne avenue and Simcoe street.

St. George's would take in the north end, Lorne avenue the east end, and Simcoe street the centre, south and west ends.

There are several teachers in the public schools, among them being Principal McRoberts of the Aberdeen school, capable of teaching the subjects.

The Practical Side.

"There has been little attention paid to this practical side of education," said Mr. Gammage. "If you go throughout the country, and visit the factories, you will see that the large number of men in responsible positions have had technical training. London has been behind in this, and it is time something was done. It will cost but little, and it will benefit the poor man's son. I think it could be placed in operation in the three schools by September at least."

"As for a technical school, that will take some time, I suppose, but an effort should be made by the council and the board to obtain such an institution. It is needed. More accommodation is needed for collegiate students, and a technical school would relieve the crowding considerably."

ASSESSORS START

WORK MARCH 1

Commissioner and Men Now Busy on Income Tax Slips.

Assessment Commissioner Grant is preparing for work on March 1. At present he is busy on the income tax slips, and other preparatory work.

"We will not commence until the first of next month," said Mr. Grant. "We have a lot of preparatory work to get finished before we can start out. It will take us some time yet."

"The income tax returns are coming in rapidly. The number is increasing, and already the taxes levied on income has reached a respectable amount."

SIXTH RECITAL OF SERIES

Women's Music Club Spent Pleasant Afternoon With French and Italian Composers.

The sixth of the series of recitals being given by the Women's Music Club was held in the Masonic Temple yesterday afternoon, when a programme of music by French and Italian composers only was rendered. WENT THROUGH ICE.

Quebec, Feb. 3.—A man named Lemay, who resided on the Boulevard Langelier, in this city, was drowned today at St. Nicholas. The horse and sleigh in which he was crossing the river at St. Nicholas on the ice bridge went through the ice, precipitating himself, the sleigh and the horse into the icy water, where the current swept them beneath the ice. No trace of the man, horse or sleigh has been found yet.

QUESTION DAY IN THE COMMONS

No Complaints Made by Japan in regard to Mr. Preston.

Ottawa, Feb. 3.—In the House today Boyce (Algoma) asked for details of the business done by Mr. W. S. Loggie's firm with the departments of marine and fisheries, militia and defense, public works, railways and canals, and the National Transcontinental Railway commission.

Mr. Loggie is the member for Northumberland, N. B.

Hon. Mr. Brodeur stated that his department had paid the company \$121 42 in 1906-07, and \$788 52 in 1907-08. Sir Frederick Borden stated that the militia department had paid nothing. Mr. Pugsley gave the same reply. Mr. Graham said he had not received his reply from his officials.

The Premier assured Mr. German (Welland) that no complaints had been received from the Japanese Government or any public bodies in Japan against W. T. R. Preston, the Canadian trade commissioner in the far east. The Government had, however, received Japanese papers commending Mr. Preston on his work.

Mr. J. E. Armstrong (E. Lambton) asked, "What means, if any, has the Government taken to improve our trade relations with Germany?"

Mr. Paterson referred him to an answer to a somewhat similar question given earlier in the session, which was to the effect that the matter had been discussed with the German officials. In reply to a second question, Mr. Armstrong was told that the total exports of agricultural products to Germany during 1908 amounted to \$551,920.

The House then proceeded to debate a resolution by Mr. Sinclair of Guysboro, in favor of the appointment of a select standing committee of the House to deal with all questions relating to the marine and fisheries.

The appointment of the proposed committee was ordered.

Mr. Brodeur announced that the Government would shortly introduce an amendment to the rules necessary to carry out an order for a new standing committee.

CORRESPONDENCE

A Serious State of Affairs.

To the Editor of The Advertiser: I was much interested in the hint thrown out by Commissioner Darch while ago that the commission might go ahead and duplicate our water mains where necessary throughout the city in order to give a satisfactory flow of water to all parts. As he said, it will be absolutely necessary to have these pipes no matter what system is installed, and a good many people think that it will be absolutely necessary to have another main from Springfield, and we can hardly afford to take the chances of a breakage of the present main.

If these two necessary additions were made to our system we would have a satisfactory pressure all over the city, and the addition to our plant would come in useful, no matter what system was subsequently adopted.

We can never afford to abandon the advantages given by the water power at once stand upon a different footing and the insurance companies would probably look at the matter rather differently from the way they are at present. I have had renewals of insurance refused to me this week and have had difficulty in placing the same elsewhere. If this move becomes general among the insurance companies there will be a hasty exodus from London, as I, for one, could not afford to take the chances of fire without insurance, and there are doubtless many others in the same fix.

The change is the result of Mr. William Kennedy, of the Central Vermont, leaving to take a position with a big locomotive concern in Chicago.

VOID AFTER 15 DAYS FROM DATE.

FRALICK EXPLAINS

And Proposed Petition That He Be Removed Will Be Dropped.

Toronto, Feb. 3.—His Honor Judge Fralick, of Belleville, called up Premier Whitney by telephone this morning, and his explanations of a charge made against him by Provincial License Inspector Ayeaerst were regarded as satisfactory, and what threatened to be a tangled situation has been averted.

In a statement to the Provincial Secretary, Mr. Ayeaerst declared that while at Madoc on Jan. 28, Judge Fralick had expressed disapproval of the conviction of two Marmora hotelmen that day on the charge of selling liquor to a minor, and had announced his intention to upset the conviction when the appeals came before him.

The two hotelmen were Wm. Golding and John Quinn. Mr. Ayeaerst had declared that he did not think it would be proper for the cases to be heard by Judge Fralick under the circumstances.

The judge explained this morning that he misunderstood the circumstances; and did not intend nor expect to hear the appeal in these two liquor cases.

It is understood that a complaint that was to be forwarded to the Minister of Justice at Ottawa will not be sent, and that further action will be dropped.

Drafting, telegraphy, designing, all these and many more subjects are taught the hundreds of boys and young men in the shops by the best of instructors.

As would be expected, the results of the work are highly gratifying. It guarantees to the company highly-skilled and competent employees, and also assists worthy young men to become as efficient as it is possible for them to be. It adds a dignity to their labor that should be extremely helpful to them as well as beneficial to the company.

Large dining-rooms are also equipped in the works, where the employees may eat at the lowest possible cost. The features are most beneficial and for this the C. P. R. has received many compliments.

It is not necessary to state that the men receive pay during the course of instruction. Apprentices are paid good wages, and are placed in a position to better themselves at no cost to themselves, and at but little labor.
