The tank was located in the basement of 79- 124 the house and reached nearly to the 137— 290 ceiling. The poor woman had evi-152- 317 dently thrown the child in and then crawled through the small space between the top of the tank on to the joists and drowned herself.

The tank was cut open and the bodies removed immediately. Mrs. Finlayson was only 27 years of age, and had been married five years. She was the daughter of Wm. Sleath, a carpenter of Seaforth, Ont., and came west to Regina two years ago. Her husband is engaged in here, and is well known. The bodies are being shipped east to Seaforth.
