Closing of West End of Bathurst a Year Ago Produces a Pretty! Muddle in Which City Street Railway and Grand Trunk Are Involved.

Street Railway Company, Hunt Bros., \$650 agreed upon closing of the west end of Bathurst when the street was closed the city cut off all means of entering a lot now a large and well-appointed dinowned by the G. pany's embankment. It was to accommodote the street railway that the street was closed. The company wanted to build an addition to its power plant, and erect extra barns, and offered to pay the city the valuation which the assessment commissioner should put on the ground.

The sum agreed upon was \$650, and rumor says it has not as yet been paid, though the deal is a couple of years old.
