Remains of Thomas and Hines To Be Interred Tomorrow at Port Stanley.

St. Thomas, Dec. 15.—The bodies of Harry Thomas and Roy Hines, two of the victims of the ill-fated Bessemer, are in an undertaking establishment here today. Thomas' body will be taken to Port Stanley some time this afternoon, and the funeral service will take place tomorrow. There will be a memorial service at Port Stanley Sunday. It has not yet been decided when Hines' funeral will take place, but it will probably be at the same time as that of Thomas, and will also be held at Port Stanley. The double funeral will then go to Union Cemetery for interment.

shows that the matter received the most careful consideration from the church authorities in Rome. Strange to relate, the appointee's name was never mentioned publicly in connection with the vacancy, most likely owing to the general impression that a resident Canadian cleric would be appointed. However, in the appointment of Rev. M. F. Fallon, the Catholics of London will have one of the most brilliant and learned administrators in Canada. Rev. Father Fallon, although at present located in Buffalo, is a Canadian, and was located in Ottawa until about three years ago. While there he established a reputation for himself as a noted orator and a zealous priest. When he was transferred to Buffalo there was a general cry of protest from all classes. He was regarded as the most popular of the clergy at Ottawa.

Toronto News: Rev. Father Fallon was formerly superior of the University of Ottawa, and it was largely through his indefatigable labors that the buildings of the university, burned a few years ago, were erected on a most imposing scale. Dr. Fallon is considered one of the most brilliant members of the Oblate community, in his new appointment. Father Fallon succeeds Archbishop McEvay, of Toronto.

Toronto Mail: Father Fallon's three predecessors in the Bishopric of London, were Bishop Walsh, Bishop O'Connor and Bishop McEvay, who in turn were called to the Archbishopric of Toronto, the former succeeding the late Archbishop Lynch. Father Fallon is known as a gentle, broad-minded and scholarly cleric, and was much beloved in Ottawa and Buffalo.

Kingston Whig: The bishop-elect is a son of Dominic Fallon, who until this year, was a resident of Kingston. Father Fallon was born in Kingston, and received his primary education in St. Mary's School under the Christian Fathers. Then he went to Ottawa College, where he received his academic education, graduating with honors. For some years he was rector of St. Joseph's church, Ottawa, and also became rector of Ottawa College. At the latter institution, he gained fame through his ability as a rugby coach. It was under his direction that the old and other Ottawa rugbites received their knowledge of the game. Several years ago Father Fallon was transferred to Buffalo, N. Y., where he became rector of Holy Angels' College, and where he is at present.

Bishop-Elect Fallon is one of the leading Roman Catholic clergymen in America today. He is of Irish parentage, he possesses an eloquence and fluency of speech that has given him rank as an orator of ability. He has written many articles on church matters that attracted wide notice. Throughout his whole career he has been a leader, being ever aggressive. As Bishop of London he should do more vigorous work than ever. His Kingston friends are proud of his latest elevation.

Toronto Globe: Archbishop McEvay received notice yesterday of the appointment of Rev. Father Fallon to the See of London. Father Fallon is one of the best-known priests in Canada. He was born in Kingston about 55 years ago, and in 1891 he joined the Oblate Order at Ottawa.

After taking his vows in the order he taught in Ottawa College for a number of years, ultimately becoming superior of the institution. He was head of the university when its buildings were destroyed by fire some years ago, and it was largely due to his zeal and energy that the college recovered so fully from the blow. About five years ago Father Fallon was removed to Buffalo, where he has since been in charge of the Holy Angels' parish. He is quite well known there as a man of learning, and is considered a fluent speaker.

Toronto Star: Father Fallon, who has been raised to the dignity of Bishop of London, is one of the best known priests in Canada.

Father Fallon's name was mentioned as one likely to be chosen, but as he knew nothing about his name being brought forward to Rome he felt compelled to make a public denial that he was expecting the honor.

The vacancy in the see of London was brought about by the elevation of Bishop McEvay to the Archbishopric of Toronto. Several names were mentioned as his likely successor, but the official word of the appointment will come to the archiepiscopal residence here, but it has not yet arrived. Rev. Dr. Kidd, secretary to his grace, had not heard the news when the Star called upon him, and seemed somewhat surprised.

"I know of him, but I do not know him personally," Dr. Kidd stated. The see of London has been vacant since June, 1907, a total of 18 months, and is somewhat of a record for Canada.
