

DIVINE SERVICE IN VICTORIA PARK

Troops in Camp Heard Splendid
Sermon by Rev. Canon Dann
Yesterday Morning.

SUNDAY IN CHURCHES

Some of the Sermons Preached By
London Pastors—Interesting
Topics Touched Upon.

There was a splendid turnout of citizens yesterday morning, when for the first time in many years the troops at camp attended divine service in Victoria park. The service commenced at 9 o'clock sharp, the men leaving the camp at 8:30 and marching to the park attended by the regimental bands.

On their way to and from Carling's Heights thousands of citizens lined the streets to see them pass and were greatly pleased at the fine appearance the soldiers made.

Upon arriving in the park, the various regiments drew up in the form of a large square, in the centre of which the drums were massed, and covered with a Union Jack. The lessons were read by Canon Davis, of the Twenty-seventh Regiment, and Rev. J. W. Hodgins, of the Thirty-third, and several hymns were sung by the men, who were accompanied by a band made up of members of the various regimental bands, about 100 strong, under the direction of Bandmaster Zeller.

Canon Dann's sermon. Canon Dann preached, and based his sermon upon the healing of the centurion's servant by Christ. He pointed out that the first quality apparent in the centurion was reverence.

"This," he said, "is something that is very much needed throughout the world today. Respect for those who are above us. Unfortunately, we are sadly lacking in this, and if we continue as we are now irreverence will be taught in his training to obey. Everything that children too often are allowed to have their own way in everything. They are pampered and spoiled. This is not the way to make strong characters."

Canon Dann urged the soldiers to obey Christ, their leader, and to obey Him and reverence Him throughout their lives.

Advice for Girls. Rev. A. J. Vining at Talbot Street Baptist Church: Young women of today need to think of more than frivolity and dress. Many of them never have a serious thought of the life to come. I saw one couple of nights ago in front of a downtown nickel theatre. All I could see at first was an immense hat. Finally I saw a face daubed with paint. The woman's hair was frizzed out, and she was chewing gum. Do you think she had any serious thoughts? There are very many like her.

Wild Oats. Rev. Richard Whiting, at the First Methodist Church: "The man who sows wild oats with the idea that after having squandered purity and noble love, he will have enough left to worship at the true altar of noble affection deceives himself, for he can only bring to the great sacramental hour of life the consequences. If he has been worshipping at a wayside altar."

Some Lessons. Dr. Ross at St. Andrew's Church, drew a number of important lessons from the life of Christ. "We should do right," he said, "because it is right apart from the consequences. If the world would follow this maxim it would be on a much higher plane."

Rev. E. Hooper, at Adelaide Street Baptist Church: "You must admit the revelation; that is beyond reason. If you depend on reason alone from start to finish, your spiritual life will be a failure. The 'Natural Man'—a name that depends on reason alone—receives not the things of the spirit of God; for they are foolishness unto him; neither can he know them, because they are spiritually discerned."

Church Union. Rev. J. G. Inkster, at the First Presbyterian Church: "It is because of these wraths, back-bittings, tumults and party strife among the denominations that many persons suffer

KIDNAPPING ENDED IN PRETTY ROMANCE

Automobile Sensation of Detroit
Terminates in Happy
Marriage.

Detroit, June 17.—That sensational kidnapping of Josephine Bomarito, Ford City's dark-eyed belle, who was apparently snatched from her parents' home by an insanely jealous lover, and a young army of his countrymen, at dusk Wednesday, was not so grandiose as it seemed.

Call her Josephine Bomarito no longer, for she is now Mrs. Marteo Leon. Marteo Leon is the young person who took an active hand in the kidnapping from the Bomarito domicile, and Josephine, according to her own smiling admission, was a very willing party to the proceedings.

Simply Agree to Wed. The marriage was a common law. No minister, priest or justice of the peace was on hand. Marteo and Josephine just agreed to be man and wife in the presence of numerous witnesses. Just an ordinary wedding celebration—one of the old country kind—caused the trouble in Ford on Wednesday night, according to those who know most of the affair. They fired shots, and Marshal Sansouci considers himself very lucky that he is alive, because he was close to the automobile containing the "kidnappers." But the shots were expressions of joy for the nuptials, according to Mrs. Leon.

Four Italians yesterday paced away many disconsolate hours on the stone floors of the county jail, because of the effort to revive the European form of matrimonial functions. Many deputy sheriffs lost hours of sleep and toiled through the dusty rounds of Ford City to gain trace of others charged with implication in the "abduction."

Father Still Peevish. But, even considering rather unpleasant features, one could close by saying that "they lived happily ever after," if it wasn't for the rather peevish disposition of Samuel Bomarito, the father of the girl. Samuel was skulking about the residence of Samuel De Maggio, 115 Catherine street, where Josephine and Marteo were married in common law style yesterday morning.

"Me let Josie come back to ma house," roared Bomarito. "No-nobody, nobody who have anything to do with this ever come back to my house. She marry Leon—I tell her marry Orlando. They take her away or she run away. I don't care."

Bomarito continued to discourse in this manner as he wandered in the direction of the De Maggio home.

Then Jose Caruso, who is declared to have been the leader of the expedition that brought about Josephine's marriage, journeyed forth to meet the enraged parent. The two met with a fervent kiss and shook hands. Bomarito broke the hold first and commenced a loud and long argument. He declared that he would not consider a reconciliation.

Wedding Stops Police Action. Josephine and Marteo drove to the De Maggio residence directly from Ford City. Yesterday morning, when it became known that her thoroughly-aroused father had succeeded in having four of the men interested in the affair locked up in the county jail, her friends immediately summoned Attorney Louis Colombo. The marriage of the two elopers was solemnized according to the common law rites.

Colombo, shortly after noon, visited Sheriff Gaston Sullivan's station, where he was willing to place the couple in the hands of the law, if the entire performance of the previous evening was proved to be a violation of the law.

"Oh, we had it all made up," observed Josephine, as she shrugged her shoulders when the sheriff and his party entered the De Maggio home. "My father, he want me to marry Sam Orlando. He bother me for a whole year, and I tell him to go away from me. Marteo here, I love him. I went with him in the auto."

BUFFET CARS ON LONDON SUBWAY
Commuter Who Misses Breakfast Can Get Meal Going to Work.

London, June 20.—New Yorkers may think their subway is up to date in every detail, but it isn't—that is, compared with London's underground. The underground here has introduced the very latest in comfort. It is running on several of its trunk lines Pullman buffet cars.

A commuter who misses his breakfast can get it on the train. Later in the day passengers can have lunch, and after 4 o'clock they may have tea. Soon the Pullmans will be attached to the theatre trains, and supper may be had on the way home.

These Pullmans are attached to trains that run to distant suburbs, but passengers living, say, half an hour or an hour from their offices may also utilize their service. The food is good and cheap, and the extra fare a trifle.

The Pullman Company has never been able to extract from Englishmen a fare equal to that familiar to Americans. The Pullman conductors on the trains to Brighton, 59 miles from London, collect only a shilling (4 cents) for the journey. The trains to Folkestone, 79 miles from London, carry Pullmans, and the Pullman fare is only a shilling.

There are no Pullmans on the long-distance trains to the north, to Glasgow and Edinburgh, but the railroad companies
