GOMPERS' JOB IS SAFE ONCE MORE

St. Louis, Nov. 17 .- Despite the opposition of the Socialist faction in the American Federation of Labor, a count of noses disclosed the fact that Gompers' job is safe, and his archenemy, Congressman-elect Victor Berger, of Milwaukee, will be unable to do him any material harm, at least in this convention.

Meanwhile, however, an insurgent movement, which has gained many supporters, has been started by Andrew Gallagher, of San Francisco. It will demand that President Gompers, and, in fact, all the other officers of association, pay more attention to central labor bodies than they seem willing to

Criticised the President. The question was brought up on the seating of a delegate from Keokuk, Ind. Gallagher contended that so long as the association had accepted the per capita tax of the Keokuk council, the delegate was entitled to seat.

John Mitchell jumped to his feet with a point of order, but Gallagher would not be denied, and the convention held its breath while Gallagher criticised Gompers to his heart's con-
