OYSTER PIE.

Put two quarts of oysters on the fire with six ounces of butter, and let remain long enough to melt the butter. Season with salt and black pepper and add half a pint of milk and cream and a large slice of bread which has been ored suits is ratine. It is a rough macut into small pieces. Prepare a dish terial. It is raised wool in plain or with paste around the sides, put in different colored threads and comes in the oysters and bake.

CREAM CANDY.

Put two cups white sugar and one cup brown sugar into kettle and pour over it one cup water and two table spoons vinegar. Cook until it hardens when put in cold water. Pour into pan and cool. Then pull for about 30 minutes, cut into small pieces with scissors. Set aside to cool. When thoroughly chilled put into quart jars and seal tightly. In a couple of days you will have fine cream candy. Flavor with peppermint for "after dinner mints.

RICE HASH.

Take equal parts of roast beef, chopped finely and well seasoned, and boiled rice. Mix thoroughly, put in buttered baking dish, cover with tomato sauce, well flavored with onion and bay leaf. Cover all with buttered bread crumbs and bake about half an

QUINCE MARMALADE.

Wash fruit, core and cut in small Put in porcelain kettle with enough water to barely cover. over slow fire until soft. Put through colander and add three-fourths its quantity of heated granulated sugar. Cook in oven one-half hour stirring frequently. Turn into tumblers.

CHICKEN TIMBALE MIXTURE. Two tablespoons butter, one-quarter stale bread brumbs, two-thirds cup milk, one cup chopped cooked chicken, one-half tablespoon chopped parsley two eggs, pepper and salt. Melt butter, add breadcrumbs and milk, then cook for five minutes, stirring constantly, add eggs well beaten, then chicken and parsley. Season, place in macaroni molds and steam twenty to thirty minutes, then turn on a plate and remove cups after a minute or two, serve with tomato sauce.

TOMATO SAUCE. One-half can tomatoes or one and three-quarters cups fresh stewed tomatoes, one slice onion, dash of red pepper, three tablespoons flour, onequarter teaspoon salt, one-third teaspoon pepper. Fry onion in butter till crisp, then add flour, then add tomatoes and seasonings, and cook for fifteen minutes. Pour two tablespoons over the individual timbale with two or three olives for a garnish. Strain the sauce before serving.





A great deal of rust can be prevented by leaving the oven door open after baking until all the moisture has evaporated. When the door is closed immediately after the removal of food steam is confined in the chamber and it turns to moisture that helps to rust out the oven very rapidly.

It is a great mistake to allow oysters to freeze in order to keep them, for by doing so their delicate flavor is injured. Place them in glass or a stone jar and stand inside the refrigerator, if it contains ice. If not cover with a cloth and stand in a cool place where they will keep cool with out freezing. If they are to be served fried, it will not harm them to put small pieces of ice in the jar with them, but do not do so till ready to bring in if to be served au natural.
