Serious Accident on Board a Lake Liner at Cleveland.

Cleveland, O., May 4.—Eight men were scalded, two so seriously they may die, when the main steam pipe to one of the boilers of the steamer State of Ohio, operated by the Cleveland and Buffalo Transit Company, exploded. The State of Ohio, a passenger boat plying between Cleveland and Buffalo, was being overhauled and repaired in the Cleveland harbor, in preparation for the first trip. Practically all the crew were aboard.

The steamer was tied to the Ninth street pier at the time of the explosion. Half a dozen ambulances answered a hurry-up call and conveyed the injured to the United States Marine and Lakes Hospitals.
