

GARBAGE CAUSED DEATH

Inspector Finds That Hogs Are Being Fed on Refuse.

That the death of many hogs has been caused by the feeding of garbage, and not through the effects of an epidemic, was the statement made by Inspector Dr. Tennant, who has been making a thorough investigation of the hog cholera scare.

The finding of many droves of hogs infected with hog cholera led to the supposition that a serious epidemic had laid hold of the porkers of Western Ontario and a rigid investigation was started to determine the cause of the disease. Droves found to be affected in West-

ster Township were destroyed, and where the disease was found to have obtained a foothold farmers were not allowed to resume the raising of pigs for a period of three months.

A story in circulation to the effect that the importation of hogs from the United States was responsible for the outbreak was denied by Dr. Tennant, who states that the feeding of garbage caused the disease in every case.

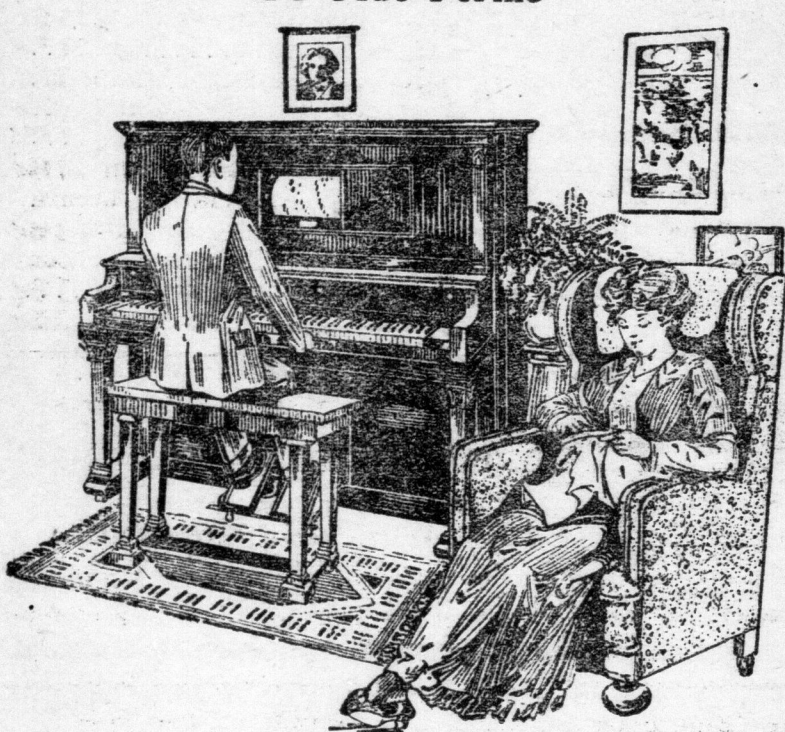

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PEA CANNERS SAY COPPER IS HARMFUL

Ask the Government to Prohibit
Its Use—Delegation at
Ottawa.

[Canadian Press.]

Ottawa, March 25.—A delegation of pea canners waited on Hon. Messrs. Nantel and Reid today. They contended that the sale of canned peas containing copper should be prohibited in Canada. Action to this effect has been taken by the United States Government on the ground of a report interpreted to condemn the use of copper salt as being harmful.

A very long discussion took place between the ministers and the delegation, which was led by J. E. Armstrong, M. P., for Lambton.

Dr. McGill, the chief analyst of the department, was also present in order that he might give information concerning the technical side of the question. It was stated at the interview that the report upon which the United States Government based its action had been carefully studied as to detail by the experts of the inland revenue department and that they have not been able to reach the same conclusion, unless copper, as used in coloring vegetables, can be shown to be poisonous. Chemists claim that copper used in coloring vegetables in the proportion of an eighteenth part of a million is not injurious to health. The Canadian adulteration act cannot be read as prohibitive in connection with green peas imported from France and other countries.

In the meantime the delegation was assured that the question was being very carefully studied by the department in order to protect the home industry as well as the consumers.

WANTS WORKMEN'S BILL EFFECTIVE SEPTEMBER 1

Toronto, March 25.—The Legislature spent this evening considering the workmen's compensation bill. Mr. Rowell sought to introduce an amendment, bringing the law into force on September 1 next, but this was rejected, as Mr. Lucas thought great harm would be done if the act was proclaimed before the commission was ready to fulfill its provisions.

Dr. McQueen made a point that medical fees should be provided out of the compensation. In many other states \$100 was allowed for this purpose. Mr. Rowell said that the essence of any such provision was one of the weaknesses of the Washington act. Mr. Lucas pointed out that any sum earmarked for medical fees, even for first aid services, would have to come off the amount of the workmen's compensation. The act was in its experimental stages, and had better be left as it was in this respect.

A change was admitted from the draft bill, that a workman particularly injured would only receive 55 per cent. of the diminution of his earnings, instead of the amount of his impairment to 55 per cent. of his earning capacity.

SENATOR CHOQUETTE DEFENDS HIS BILL

Says Booksellers and Newspapers Support It—Answers Senator Dennis.

[Canadian Press.]

Ottawa, March 25.—The debate was resumed in the Senate today by Senator Choquette, of Quebec, on his bill to amend the criminal code by forbidding newspapers to reproduce portraits of persons charged with crime.

In reply to Senator Dennis, of Halifax, who last week made a speech against the bill, saying the bill proposed to heap opprobrium on the heads of the publishers and booksellers of Canada and said there was no demand for Senator Choquette's bill, Senator Choquette read a letter from the secretary of the Retailers' Association, written from Toronto. The letter said that the booksellers of Canada were in favor of the bill. Senator Choquette read a letter from a man "who had been on the Supreme Court bench of Nova Scotia for 23 years," and who approved his bill. From all other parts of the country he had received letters of commendation. Newspapers themselves had expressed themselves in favor of the bill passing.

Papers Giving Approval.
The Acadian Recorder, of Halifax, was one of them, also La Patrie, of Montreal. La Presse, of Montreal, the Ottawa Citizen, L'Action Sociale, of Quebec, had approved of his bill and condemned Senator Dennis' attitude toward it. He regretted the attitude of the Montreal Gazette, but that was the affair of that paper, which was generally sound.

If he proposed, pictures would be published only by the authority of the Provincial Attorney-General of a province and the courts, the picture would mean something. It would then really be taken as the picture of a criminal and the person would be regarded as a criminal. In this way the newspapers would serve a useful purpose, to the cause of justice.

Senator Dennis had said Parliament could do better by enacting a law to prevent immodest spectacles on the stage, the display of posters advertising them and also dealing with women's costumes, especially the slit skirt and the absence of underwear. Senator Choquette agreed as to the stage, but thought it would be a bold man who tried to regulate feminine fashions. He would be running his head against a stone wall.

Would Sew Up the Slit, Too.
However, if Senator Dennis would bring in a bill to forbid the slit skirt or any other fashion tending to immorality, Senator Choquette said he would second the bill. Senator Dennis had talked of "gagging the press," but Senator Choquette declared that there was no proposal to "gag" the press. Senator Choquette declared that the opposition of Senator Dennis to the bill was inspired by material considerations. He strongly insisted that the bill was needed to correct and check the growing tendency toward yellow journalism.

Senator Coffey adjourned the debate.

ILLEGAL SALE COST \$40

MONTREAL LAND INQUIRY INVOLVES TEN PERSONS

Two Aldermen and One ex-Alderman Charged With Malversation.
Montreal, March 25.—Ten persons, including two aldermen and one ex-alderman, are charged with malversation in their dealings on the expropriation of land by the city, by Justice Fortin in the course of his judgment on the land inquiry, delivered today. In addition three others are charged with infidelity, while Ex-Recorder F. K. Dupuis is mentioned in the judgment, his action in accepting a commission being questioned. Those charged with malversation are Ald. Levesque, Ald. Judge, Ex-Ald. Lamoureux, H. Ylennauve, H. Carlin, J. L. Bourgeois, E. Pelland, J. H. Proulx, C. Larina and Aristide Robert, while P. J. Champagne, J. H. Charette and J. A. C. Payette are said to have been guilty of infidelity.

Ald. Garceau is cleared of suspicion.

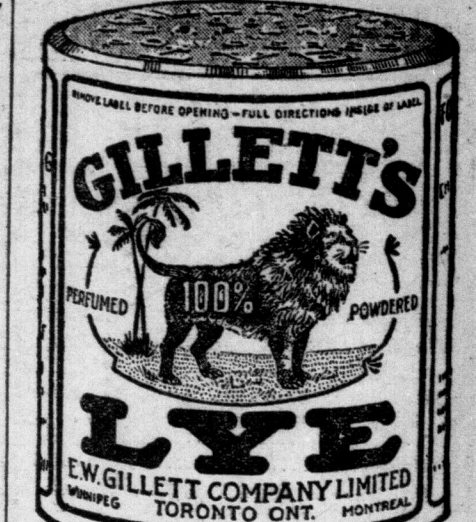
