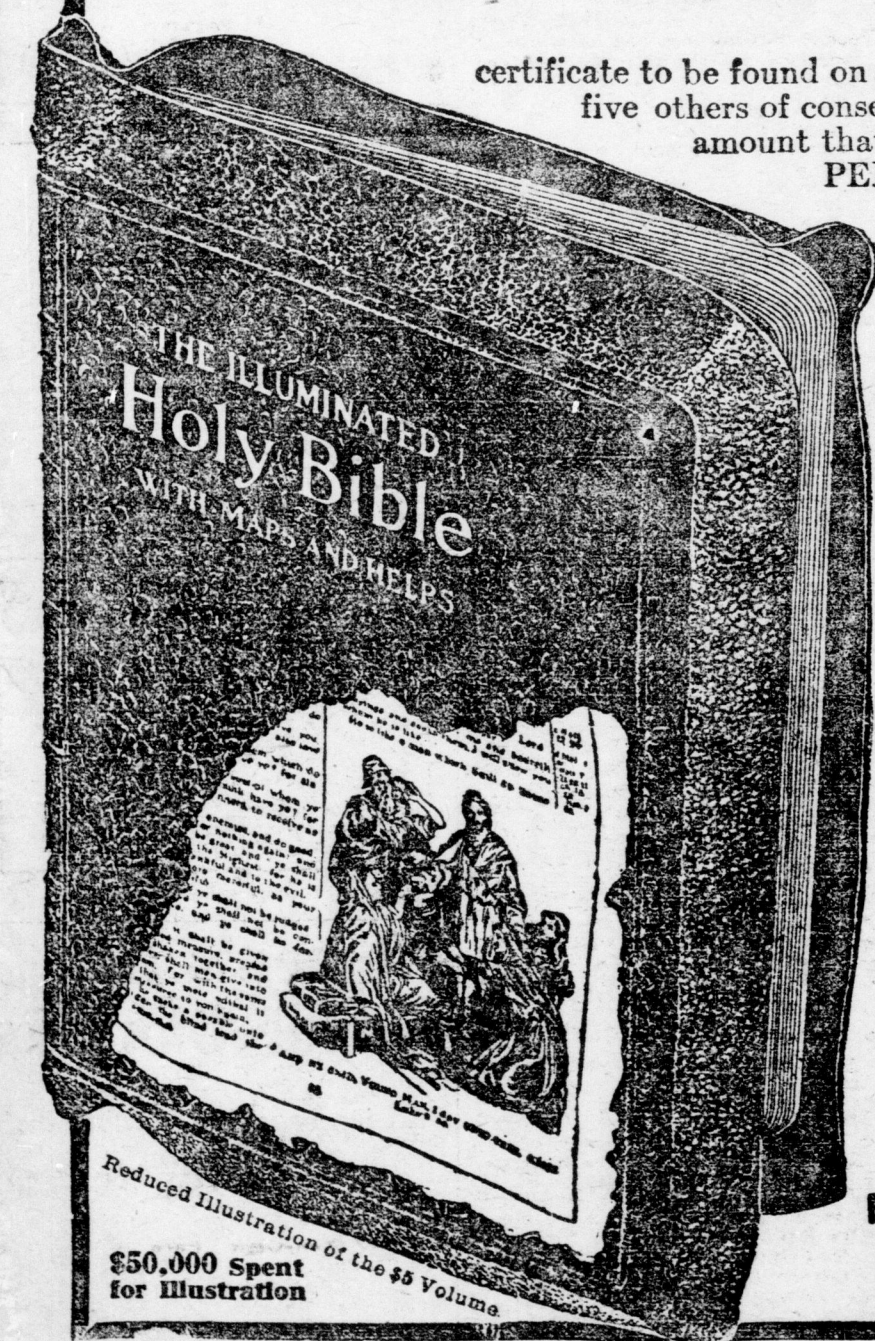

CHARLES M'DONALD DIED AT WYOMING

Resided Near London for a Number of Years.

Wyoming, Feb. 3.—The funeral of Mr. Charles McDonald, held from the family residence on the Wyoming side-road north, on Sunday afternoon, was very largely attended. An impressive ceremony was conducted by Rev. J. A. Ross, of the Presbyterian Church, of which Mr. McDonald was a lifelong member.

Mr. McDonald had been in delicate health for some months through hardening of the arteries. He was 63 years old, and a native of Scotland. He came to Canada to work in the employ of the late Mr. James McLaren, farmer, about two miles from London, where he made his home for several years, and where he was married.

Later he moved to the present homestead, Wyoming, where he had

A widow and four daughters and one son survive him. One son died from injuries sustained by a fall from the top of a silo two years ago, and his death was a severe blow to the father, even then in poor health.

BALKED THE MILITANTS

London Public Institutions and Royal Palaces Have Been Closed.

New York, Feb. 3.—A London cable says: In consequence of the smashing of the glass, showcases in the jewel house of the Tower of London on Saturday, it has been decided to close the jewel house temporarily. Special precautions against suffragette outrages are being taken at the British Museum, the National Gallery and other public buildings. The number of police at the Guildhall has been increased.

The suffragettes had openly threatened to do damage in certain of the royal palaces, and the official announcement that Kensington, Hampton Court, Kew, and Holyrood are to remain closed to the

public until further notice leaves them with a gap in their program that may require a day or two to fill up.

SEINE RISING RAPIDLY

Repetition of Disastrous Inundation of Last Year Is Feared.

Paris, Feb. 3.—Fears of the repetition of the disastrous inundations which occurred in Paris during the winter of 1910-11 have been aroused by the rapid rising of the Seine. The water is mounting today about two inches every hour.

In the low-lying quarters of the city, especially in the southwestern district of Bercy, the water has overflowed into some of the streets. The Rue Watt, near the Tolbiac bridge, was the first to be flooded. It is now several inches under water and consternation reigns among the occupants of adjacent houses.

Rain ceased this morning in Paris itself, but it continues to fall heavily in the up-country reaches.

MENELIK AGAIN REPORTED DEAD

One of His Grandsons Said To Have Succeeded to Abyssinian Throne.

REPORT IS UNOFFICIAL

New Emperor, Who Was Selected By Dead Monarch, Is Only Seventeen Years of Age.

London, Feb. 3.—King Menelik of Abyssinia is dead, according to a special dispatch received here from Addis-Abeba today. His successor, Prince Lijl Jeassu, one of his grandsons, entered the capital on Sunday with great pomp.

No official confirmation has been received here of the death of Menelik, who had on several previous occasions been reported dead.

Prince Lijl Jeassu, who is said to have entered the Abyssinian capital as the new emperor, is only about seventeen years old. He was selected some years ago by Menelik himself as his successor. He is a youth of great intelligence, and is the son of Ras Michael, a powerful prince and governor of three Abyssinian provinces, whose wife was Menelik's daughter. Lijl Jeassu speaks English, French and German, and has been instructed by European tutors.

Reported Before.

There have been many rumors during the past five years of Menelik's death, and it was reported at one time that the Empress was conducting the affairs of the Abyssinian Kingdom until Lijl Jeassu was old enough to take the government into his own hands. This was denied officially, and at the beginning of last year Menelik was reported to be paralyzed below the waist, and uncertainty has since reigned as to the situation.

GAYNOR'S ASSAILANT DEAD

Man Who Shot New York's Mayor a Victim of Paresis.

Trenton, N. J., Feb. 3.—Jas. J. Gallagher, the man who shot Mayor Gaynor of New York, nearly two years ago at Hoboken, N. J., died here today at the New Jersey State Hospital for the Insane in this city. Death was due to paresis. He had been at the state hospital since Jan. 18, 1912, having been transferred there from the New Jersey State Prison, where he had been sentenced to serve 12 years on a charge of assault upon Street Commissioner Wm. Edwards, of New York city, who was with Mayor Gaynor at the time. Gallagher was never prosecuted for shooting the mayor. This was at Mayor Gaynor's request.

DIED AT STRATHROY

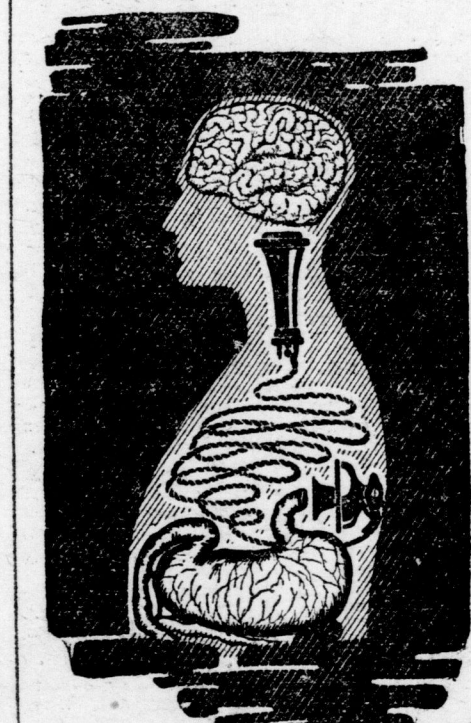
Aaron Gill Never Recovered From Effects of Paralytic Stroke.

TWO BOYS FOUND DEAD AND MOTHERS ARRESTED

East St. Louis Police Investigating a Mysterious Double Tragedy.

East St. Louis, Ill., Feb. 3.—Mrs. Pearl Belle Stebbins and Mrs. Nellie Carpenter, mothers of two boys who were found dead of gas asphyxiation in the same bed Sunday, are under arrest here.

The boys, George Stebbins, 12 years old, and Ralph Carpenter, six, were discovered dead when Mrs. Carpenter returned to her home in the morning in a three-fourth story house in a bedroom adjoining that occupied by the boys, which at one time had been connected to a gas range, was the source of the fumes which caused the boys' deaths. There was no cap on the pipe, and none was found on the floor. There the company of a man, it was testified at the coroner's inquest. The other woman was away from home all night, being found by the police shortly before noon.

There were no other gas fixtures in the house. At the inquest last night it was testified that late Saturday night Mrs. Stebbins was seen to enter the house in which the boys were sleeping and that a man and a woman waited her reappearance on the sidewalk in front.

DOCTOR ISSUES WRIT: TROUBLE OVER PRACTICE

Agreement Made at Elmira Alleged To Have Been Broken.

Mr. J. F. Pauls, barrister, of this city, has issued a writ upon the instructions of Dr. Robert W. Pauls, of Elmira, Waterloo County, against John H. Ratz, in which the plaintiff claims unstated damages for breach of an agreement under seal, and also for an injunction restraining the defendant from practicing his profession within 25 miles of Elmira. The plaintiff in his statement of claim alleges that he purchased the practice of Dr. Ratz, and that an agreement was made whereby the latter was not to practice within 25 miles of Elmira. Since the date of the agreement defendant has commenced practice in Preston.

BERNARD SHAW OFFENSIVE

Noted French Critic Takes a Slam at the English Dramatist.

Paris, Feb. 2.—Bernard Shaw, the adaptation of whose play, "You Never Can Tell," just produced in Paris, has been having a hot time at the hands of the French critics. Abel Hermant, the distinguished writer and critic, after tracing a certain relationship between British humor and French humor, expresses the following opinion: "He is immature, he is sought, he is dry. The great fault with this author which renders his words sarcasm irritating to the last degree is that his cruelty is disproportionate to the persons and the object. Shaw has no sense of proportion whatever, and he thinks that his pieces have an influence, and a portee, He thinks he is a prophet and a precursor, and that he is shaking society to the foundations because he has toppled over a few lies of the social order. When one sees how even revolutions change so slightly the face of the world one can hardly help smiling at his poor perspective. I would not like to grieve Shaw by saying things that will surely be most disagreeable in his ears, but I am obliged to. Mr. Bernard Shaw is in the offensive."

MAIL CARRIERS ARE UP IN ARMS

Those Running Out of Woodstock Say They Have Not Been Paid.

Woodstock, Feb. 3.—Mail carriers on the rural routes from Woodstock are up in arms against the Conservative Government because they are not being paid in contract time. One stated today that the contract calls for their salary to be paid every three months, but allows the Government 20 days more in which to get the checks out. He said that under the Liberal Government the money was always on hand ten or twelve days after, but during last year the cash was not continued, and no money has been received for October, November, December or January, and the contract has been broken without a word of explanation.

TRAGEDY AT BRIGHTON

Quarrel Between Father and Son Said To Have Caused Death.

Brighton, Feb. 3.—Reuben Flindall, of Murray Township, near the upper bridge of the canal here, died Sunday night as the result of a fractured skull. It is alleged that the injury was due to Flindall's son, Bruce Flindall, in a quarrel, striking his father on the head with a sleigh stake. The coroner will open an inquest tonight at 8 o'clock. Reuben Flindall was 55 years old; his son 27.

MOUNTED POLICE HEAD DIES OF HIS WOUNDS

Shot a Week While Attempting Capture of a Galician Wife-Deserter.

Dauphin, Man., Feb. 3.—Charles Rooke, of the Manitoba Mounted Police, and police magistrate, died in the hospital here at 1 o'clock this morning after having made a hard but hopeless fight for life since Sunday week, when he was shot through the lungs while trying to arrest John Baran, a Galician home-steader, wanted for wife-desertion. Anne Chiswick, the woman who was living with Baran, and who claims she did the shooting, made an ante-mortem statement today in attempting to capture Baran after Rooke was shot, the posse fired at the house, and besides fatally injuring the woman, killed her babe, only to find Baran was not within, though he was arrested later on.

Rooke was born at Red Hill, Surrey, England, May 5, 1876, being the son of Inspector General Rooke, of the Indian army, and was educated at Wellington College. He came to Western Canada in 1895, and served five years with the Northwest Mounted Police. In 1905, the Manitoba Government gave him the job of organizing the Manitoba Mounted Police, a body whose efforts were mainly directed to the suppression of lawlessness along the international boundary line. He made his name a terror to horse thieves, rogues and smugglers, and soon made the frontier as safe as any other part of the province. Latterly his headquarters have been here, where he acted as police magistrate with jurisdiction over much of the north country. He leaves a wife and one son. A brother, E. G. Rooke, news editor of the Nelson News, and former publisher of Port Hope, (Ont.) Times, is looking after the funeral arrangements.

COURT DISMISSES APPEAL OF JOHNSON

Washington, Feb. 3.—The supreme court today dismissed the appeal of Jack Johnson, the negro pugilist champion, indicted in Chicago on a charge of violation of the federal white slave act, from the decision of the federal court of Northern Illinois.

HARD ON CALGARY

A Chicago Detective Says Vice Is Rampant in Western City.

Calgary, Feb. 3.—Isabelle Ernest, a Pinkerton detective, who came here to locate a young girl who ran away from her home in Oklahoma with a young Calgarian, and who took the girl away with her, gave out an interview in which she said:

"Though I have been in a good many cities, I can safely say that I have found none the size of Calgary that can compare with it in regard to girls living partly vicious lives."

"Your blocks are full of them, and my search for this girl I discovered the fact that girls have sold themselves to obtain the bare necessities of life, because of paucity of their wages."

"If these girls did not sell themselves occasionally to obtain what they need to live the life they are forced to live in the city, they could not afford any longer to live and sleep in comfort, or dress themselves in accordance with the demands of the establishments where they are employed."

"Briefly, if they were good, they could not afford to work for the wages they are receiving. Some of these girls are living with men, who are enrolled on the church membership rolls of your city."

"In your blocks you have hundreds of these girls. Some of them are really bad and started bad young, but there are others just like the girl I am taking away, who are of good families of Canada and the United States, and their mothers believe they are working hard and living on the wages they say they earn."

"Your city has Chicago beat in this respect."

STRATHROY TO VOTE ON FACTORY BYLAW

Ratepayers May Loan Auto Company Fifty Thousand Dollars.

M. Pincombe, for a consideration of \$1,900. Mr. Sutherland intends remodeling the red brick portion into a sales and feed stable for horses.
