by forest fires. Present reports indicate that the loss towns of Cochrane and South Porcupine, which were swept away in 1911, have been saved. Cochrane was then a "shack" town; today it has rows of brick buildings, permanent pavements, sewers, electric lighting and waterworks. These new communities have a phoenix-like facility for rising from their ashes. The effects of the great fire of 1911 were evident a year later only by improved appearances.
