LOSES HIS MOTHER

J. Couch, of Chicago, Asks

The Advertiser To Find

Her.

PRIVATE ILL OF PLEURISY

18th Battalion Men Taken to Victoria

Hospital.

Pte. McKinnon, of A Company, 18th

Battalion, was taken to Victoria Hos-

pital yesterday very ill with pleurisy.

A large number of cases of mumps

have developed at the camp in the past

two days, and many soldiers are going

around with badly swollen and very

painful jaws.

To a large extent, drill has been

suspended for the men of the 23rd and 7th

C. M. R., owing to the illness following

inoculation with the virus.

The 7th C. M. R., who were inoculated,

will, it is expected, be ready to resume

work Tuesday. Major Smith yesterday

commenced inoculating the men of the

23rd, and several hundred were given

the treatment.

Captain Shuttleworth Tells of Military

Affairs in East.

Captain Shuttleworth, of Base Com-

pany, 18th Battalion, returned Sun-

day from Kingston, where he was vis-

iting officers of the 21st Regiment

which is brigaded with the 18th. He

says it is one of the finest battalions

he has seen.

"The people of the district," he said,

the 21st, and anything that the regi-
