France in which he says: 'The Allies have it in their power to win, but this does not mean that is close at hand or that the hardest fighting and the heaviest losses

Enemy Not Defeated.

"The vast German armies occupying and devastating a great part of France and most of Belgium are held in check, it is true, but in no sense are they defeated. Our men at the front are keen, skilled and determined, and our victory enthusiasm and confidence. Their one desire now is to advance, but this they cannot do without better support from their mates and rulers at home. They fully realize that the casualties already neurred must be doubled and trebled before the victory finally is won Why Shell Shortage?

"They cannot understand why greatest manufacturing country in the world should not supply them with sufficient shells eight months after the outbreak of the war, and they express themselves freely on this subject.

'In the meanwhile we all must make up lost time, not counting the cost.
"Men and shells in an increasing stream is the need of the hour." Col. Lee retired from the army

Secretary Bryan made this announcement today, but would not discuss the details

of the reply Secretary Bryan declined to say whether the reply accepted the ambassador's memorandum as from the German Government or as an expression of Count Bernstorff's personal views. The reply, however, gives it official recognition, leaving the question of its authority between the ambassador and hi Governmen
