Will Not Seek Position for Veteran I Miss Minnie Walker Remains in Office.

Following the many rumors that objection is being taken by the United Farmers of Ontario to the appointment of Miss Minnie Walker, who has since the death of Joseph Marshall ween acting registrar for Middlesex County, as registrar, and the possibility of a change, the different soldiers' organizations have been interestingly watching the situation with a view to urging the appointment of a returned soldier to the position, should the farmers succeed in their reported efforts to have Miss Walker removed.

INSPECTOR WILL ASSIST IN FUEL CONSERVATION

Will Advise Local Manufacturers How to Equip Furnaces to Save Coal.

Following out its plan to see that manufacturers and other large users of bituminous coal conserve their supplies to the utmost, the Ontario Fuel Board has sent one of its inspectors, N. L. Griffin, to visit some of the cities and towns of Western Ontario, to give advice that may be desired by such coal consumers as to possible improvements in their furnaces, whereby the utmost heat units may be secured from the fuel.

Mr. Griffin, who arrived in the city on Wednesday, is a specialist in this particular branch of engineering, and will remain in the city for a few days, and it is hoped that local users of bituminous coal will take advantage of his visit, so that a greater saving may be made than has attended the efforts of consumers heretofore.


